Campgrounds, Other Sites Open for Summer

NORTH BEND, Ore. – With warmer weather signaling the start of summer, Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Coos Bay District campgrounds and other recreation sites are opening Memorial Day weekend for visitors looking for ways to spend time outside.

The BLM operates ten campgrounds with 158 campsites near Reedsport, Coquille, and other locations along the southern Oregon coast. In addition to camping, there are five day-use areas and thirty-five miles of trail to explore on public lands. Popular sites include the Dean Creek Elk Viewing Area, Doerner Fir, North Spit, and Smith River Falls campground. Of the sites BLM manages, 80% are free of charge.

Loon Lake Recreation Area will open for the summer on Thursday, May 21st. Campsites, showers, a fishing dock, boat ramp, hiking trail, and sandy beach are all available. Many of the campsites at Loon Lake can be reserved by calling Reserve America at 1-877-444-6777, or by visiting their website at www.Recreation.gov. There are several non-reservation sites also available throughout the campground.
