## **BLM Free Fishing Day**

**Roseburg, Ore.** – The 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Cooper Creek Free Fishing Day near Sutherlin takes place on Saturday, June 12. The event coincides with National Fishing Week to increase awareness and enjoyment of sport fishing across the nation.

The event begins at 9:00 a.m. and runs until 3:00 p.m. in the afternoon. Although a State fishing license is not required, other State regulations such as the five trout fish limit will apply. For those not bringing their own equipment, a limited number of fishing rods, reels, hooks and bait will be available for anglers going after some of the large number of trout that will be released into Cooper Reservoir just prior to Free Fishing Day.

Free Fishing Day activities will include a kids' spin casting contest, fly casting, two fishing pools for children eight years old and under, an hourly big and small fish contest, hourly door prizes, and the hilarious bumbling fisherman skit. About the BLM: The BLM manages more land – 253 million surface acres – than any other Federal agency. This land, known as the National System of Public Lands, is primarily located in 12 Western States, including Alaska. The Bureau, with a budget of about \$1 billion, also administers 700 million acres of sub-surface mineral estate throughout the nation.
