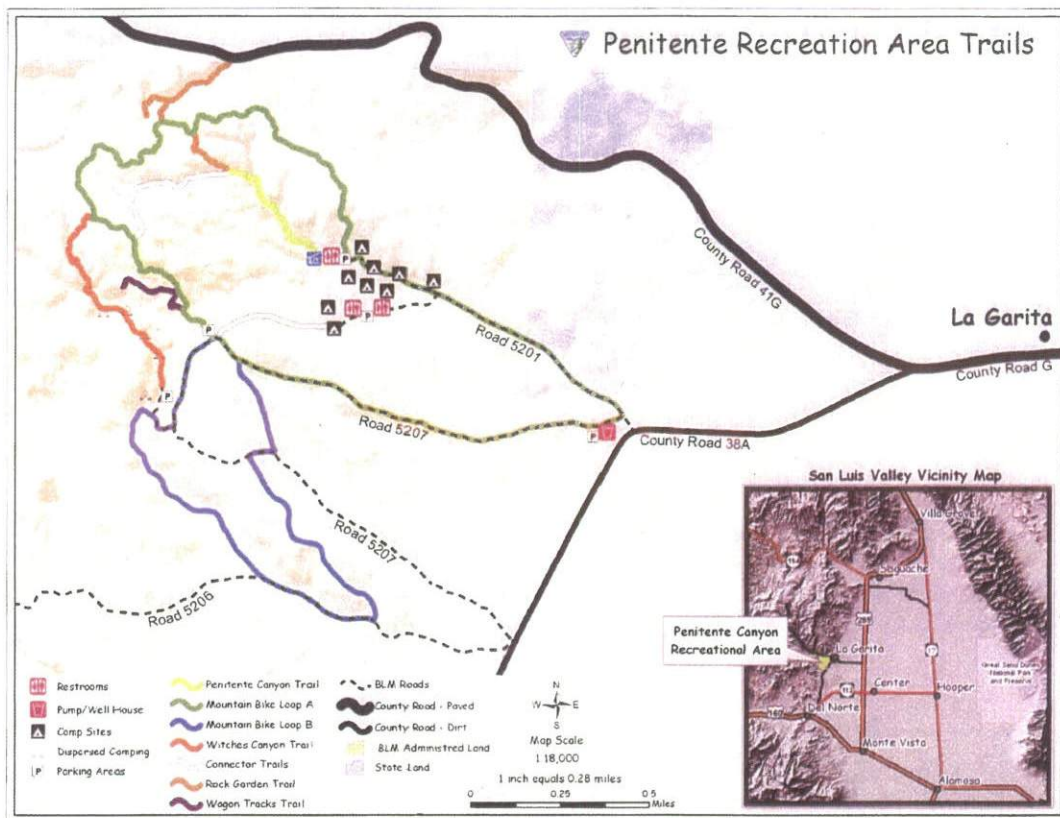

Setting & General Description (include description of the site, natural resources/features, scenic values, recreational attractions, amenities, current/projected visitation, etc.):

Penitente Canyon Campground is located within the Penitente Canyon Special Recreation Management Area, an internationally recognized sport rock climbing destination managed by the Saguache Field Office. The facility has 18 walk-in tent sites, 5 drive-in tent or camper sites, 2 group sites, 3 vault toilets, trash receptacles, and a water system.

Besides the principal attraction of rock climbing, the area is also home to a mountain biking trail system, and a number of important cultural and historic sites. All of these attractions are primarily accessed through the combined campground and free day-use area. Not surprisingly, given its popularity with climbers, the campground and general area are physically defined by impressive geologic formations, the remnants of the La Garita Caldera volcanic explosion from 26 million years ago. The historic and heritage-based aspects of Penitente Canyon (Native American pictographs, Spanish pictographs, and wagon tracks of the Old Spanish National Historic Trail carved into the rocks) are expressed by a very modest interpretive program as well.

Despite its increasing popularity among visitors, Penitente Canyon is still characterized by its sense of solitude and spirituality. Based on data collected in 2010, of the over 40,000 annual visitors to the recreation area, 21,000 of them came specifically to Penitente Canyon. Increased visitation to Penitente Canyon is a trend that is expected to continue due to increasing participation in the sport of rock climbing, the promotion of Penitente Canyon as a heritage tourism destination by the Colorado Tourism Office (Penitente Canyon was also the subject of a Channel 4 Colorado Getaways segment in June 2010), and increasing population projections for the country as a whole, the West, and especially Colorado in the years ahead.

2. CURRENT AND PROJECTED REVENUES and ANNUAL OPERATION & MAINTENANCE COSTS

Revenues: Current annual revenues generated at Penitente Canyon Campground have averaged around \$3,700 in recent years. Projected annual revenue (based on approval of the proposed fee increase) is expected to be around \$6,800

Operations & Maintenance: Fee expenditures for O&M in recent years have averaged around \$3,375 per year - \$1,375 for CG Maintenance worker salary, \$500 for supplies (including water system compliance and testing expenses), and \$1,500 for toilet pumping. Projected expenses (based on approval of the proposed fee increase) are expected to be similar for FY 11, with the addition of \$1,000 for deferred sign maintenance.

4. FEE COLLECTION METHOD AND ESTIMATED FEE COLLECTION COSTS

Method: On-site self pay station with Campground maintenance worker compliance checks.

Costs: Salary of CG Maintenance worker, who collects fees weekly as part of other maintenance duties. Fee collection for a GS-4 Maintenance worker at \$18.25 x 30min./wk for approx. 30 weeks= \$275. (Note: Total cost of a seasonal CG maintenance worker =\$16,500.

Note: No collection costs are incurred for sites under the National Recreation Reservation Service (NRRS).

5. FEE DETERMINATION PROCESS SUMMARY

Fair Market Value Comparison (compare similar fees at other FS, state, federal, or private recreation sites in the area with similar facilities & services):

Facility type(s): Public Lands-style Developed Campgrounds and one private campground/RV park.

Number of facilities compared: 30+

Proximity to project area: Throughout the San Luis Valley and within 50 miles outside of the Valley.

Price range:

- **Rio Grande National Forest: \$5-\$16 for individual sites and \$26-\$32 for group sites (similar to other National Forest and Field Office campgrounds in surrounding areas and based on varying services and amenities).**
- **Great Sand Dunes National Park and Preserve: \$14 for individual sites and \$65-\$80 for group sites, plus park entrance fees (similar to other National Park system campgrounds in surrounding areas).**
- **San Luis Lake State Park: \$20/night for all campsites.**
- **Fun Valley RV Camping: \$24.50/night for 2 people. (Private CG's in the San Luis Valley are typically RV campgrounds with full hook-ups).**

Selected fee and method: Increase from \$5 to \$11/night per individual site and \$15 to \$20/night per group site.

Comments: Currently, operations and maintenance of Penitente Canyon CG (San Luis Valley BLM's only developed campground), which includes fee collection, compliance checks, visitor services and safety patrols are being conducted as part of the San Luis Valley Public Lands Center's Service First partnership with the Rio Grande National Forest.

6. PLANNED USE OF FEES RETURNED TO SITE (list by priority; include daily O&M if appropriate; add to list if appropriate)

1. **Improve public safety through increased visitor services and Law Enforcement and security patrols.**
2. **Improve sanitation with improved operations and maintenance, bear-proof trash cans and additional toilets.**
3. **Improve Accessibility and reduce barriers to all developed sites and amenities.**
4. **Protect cultural resources located in campground through interpretation, education and physical means.**
5. **Improve natural resource protection by reducing soil erosion on campsites and trails, the spread of noxious weeds and damage to rock resources from climbing activities.**
6. **Improve routine and annual operations and maintenance with increased patrols, equipment and supplies.**
7. **Reduce deferred maintenance with rehabilitation of campsites, roads, trails, parking areas and replacement of campsite amenities and signs.**
8. **Expand interpretation of cultural and natural history – a high priority with visitors as expressed in a recent GPRC survey. Implement Penitente Canyon SRMA Interpretation Plan - this includes signs, kiosks, brochures, maps, etc.**
9. **Improve visitor experiences by being responsive to customer desired enhancements and aesthetic improvements to the campground.**

8. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION RESULTS

Campground visitor contacts have been documented since June, 2009. To date, all fee-paying visitors to the campground that provided comments about the proposed fee increase have expressed understanding and the need for a fee increase in order to continue to provide existing services, to address the deferred maintenance backlog, as well as to expand and enhance customer desired visitor services, such as new interpretation.

A news release was submitted to local area papers, Congressional staffs, Saguache and Alamosa County Commissioners, and internally to San Luis Valley Public

Lands Center employees on or before September 21, 2010. The same information was posted at information kiosks at the campground along with customer comment cards. The complete proposal will also be posted to the BLM website on or about October 1, 2010.

Combined with the 5 documented campground visitor contacts, only one other comment has been received at this time, which appeared to be the result of a frustration with out of state campground hosts (presumably in concessionaire campgrounds), which exist at some locations on the neighboring Rio Grande National Forest.


