

Today, the City of Salmon upholds its reputation as a community tied together through traditional family values and a sense of community. In 2004 the City was recognized as an Idaho Heritage City and Community of Promise by the Association of Idaho Cities and was recently honored as one of the 100 Best Cities for Young People by America's Promise organization, founded by Colin Powell.

**Climate:** Summer temperatures average 70 degrees and winter temperatures average about 26 degrees (occasional minus temperatures).

**Recreation:** Salmon, Idaho, gateway to some of the last wild river systems in America, takes pride in sharing its wilderness heritage with visitors from all over the world. Two premier whitewater rivers, the Main Salmon and the Middle Fork of the Salmon slice through the two and a quarter million acre "River of No Return" Wilderness, providing unequalled opportunities to see the splendor of an America untouched since Native Americans were alone in these lands. Salmon offers endless opportunities for hunting, fishing, hiking, whitewater rafting, horseback riding, camping and everything involving the outdoors. Salmon's closest ski area, Lost Trail Powder Mountain, is about 45 miles north of Salmon.

**Estimated Population:** 3,300

**Schools:** Salmon's public school system involves one elementary school, one middle school, one high school and one alternative high school.

**Nearest Airport:** Salmon Airport, which provides weekday commuter flights between Boise, McCall, and Salmon as well as charter and per-person rates to many of Idaho's backcountry airstrips. Idaho Falls Airport, which offers commercial flights, is about 200 miles away.

**Economy:** In Lemhi County, 3,804 people are employed, with a 5.5% unemployment rate. Salmon's job market is diverse; many people work in retail, agriculture, state and federal government, outdoor recreation, and cattle ranching.

Salmon is a small rural community of 3,300 residents nestled in the mountains of Central Idaho. Located along the Salmon River, "The River of No Return," the City of Salmon is proud of its rich history that includes strong traditions of mining, lumbering and family ranching. Lewis and Clark crossed the Continental Divide in 1805 into the Salmon Valley during their expedition to the Pacific Ocean and received essential supplies and information from Sacajawea's people, the AgaiDika Shoshone.
