

The city lies on the edge of the spectacular Snake River Canyon and is just two miles from world famous Shoshone Falls. Good work prospects for job seekers and a moderate climate for retirement have helped keep Twin Falls County's population on a steady growth curve.

The Weather: The city is located in the Snake River Plain, where the topography and altitude have given the area a moderate four-season climate. Summers are dry, with very little precipitation, and the average July temperatures are in the high 80s. Winters receive snowfall but rarely become uncomfortably cold.

Recreation: Parks, golf courses, and docks follow the Snake River as it winds through the region – the steep canyon walls frame the setting for fishing, boating, rafting, and waterskiing. Scenic in-town walking trails wind along the floor of intimate Rock Creek Canyon and the rim of the mighty Snake River Canyon. Even when drought reduces the flows plunging over nearby Shoshone Falls, it's worth a visit to the lush, roomy park overlooking the city's famous falls.. From there, walkers with extra energy and a taste for urban wilderness can choose a trail ascending from the park to the canyon rim above, or one circling nearby Dierkes Lake.



Twin Falls

Estimated Population: 36,742

Schools: The Twin Falls school district offers seven elementary schools, two middle schools, one high school and three alternative schools. A new high school is currently under construction. The College of Southern Idaho is also located in Twin Falls. As a comprehensive two-year community college, it annually serves some 9,000 students with credit classes and another 8,000 with non-credit professional and enrichment courses. Some 10,000 to 40,000 people come to the campus monthly for workshops and events.

Nearest Airport: Twin Falls Airport

Economy: The civilian labor force has also grown steadily in the last decade, and Twin Falls County has kept at or below the U.S. and Idaho unemployment rates. In the 2003 economic downturn, the Magic Valley Labor Market Area, consisting of Twin Falls, Gooding and Jerome counties, consistently outperformed the rest of the state. Close to a thousand new jobs have been created over the last two years alone, and Twin Falls County has had a strong upsurge in retail and service sector jobs.

Twin Falls began as an agricultural center, springing up from the high desert of Southern Idaho. The town served the pioneering farmers who homesteaded the irrigated lands of the fertile Snake River Plain.
