Brief Description of Project Area

Bird Creek Recreation Area and Picnic Area is located on the foothills of the High Schells Wilderness in White Pine County Nevada. Approximately 25 miles from Ely, Nevada this site receives moderate use throughout the summer months consisting mainly of family reunions and weddings. Use increases slightly in the late summer early fall from the influx of hunters in the area looking for a camping spot. There are 8 sites available and there is one SST that services the entire area. Water spigots at every site. Each site has a concrete slab with numerous tables situated therein. The Bird Creek runs through the entire facility and wildflowers are abundant in the early summer. Sites are situated amongst water birch, wild rose, willow and aspen trees.

Brief Description of Project Area

White River Campground is located approximately 40 miles Southwest of Ely, Nevada. Surrounded by Red Mountain Wilderness directly to the south, Currant Mountain Wilderness, White Pine Range Wilderness to the west and Bald Mountain Wilderness to the north it is truly surrounded by wild country. Not much recreation occurs in this area during the summer months other than a few folks out camping. Hunting season sees a few more people but not many. The campground is situated along White River with all of the sites located near the banks of the stream. Each site has a table and fire ring. 4 vault toilets serve the 10 sites within this area. Trash cans have been removed from this site due to continued vandalism and Pack It In/Pack It Out signs have been posted as a step to inform the public of Leave No Trace ethics relating to the wilderness that surrounds them.
