A. Background

Proposed Action Title: Christmas Tree Harvesting

Location of Proposed Action:

Christmas tree selection will be in designated areas throughout the Medford District.

Description of Proposed Action:

Harvesting of Christmas trees by permit in designated areas only.

Design Features for the Proposed Action

- Harvest only trees that are less than 12 feet tall; keep stump height of no more than 12 inches above the ground; and harvest a tree only if there is no other tree within 12 feet of it
- Harvest only on public lands that are open for Christmas tree harvest. Do not cut trees on private property. Do not cut within fenced or posted tree plantations. Do not cut trees within 200 feet of state highways, campgrounds, and other developed areas.
- Resale of Christmas trees and /or permits is not permitted.
- Validate and attach your permit to your tree before transporting.
- One permit is required for each tree.

B. Land Use Plan Conformance

Land Use Plan Name: *Medford District Record of Decision and Resource Management Plan (ROD/RMP)*

Date Approved: June 1995

The proposed action is in conformance with the RMP because it is specifically provided for in the following RMP decision:

“Manage for the production and sale of special forest products when demand is present and where actions taken are consistent with primary objectives for the land use allocation. (ROD/RMP, p. 75).

C. Compliance with NEPA

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9 C(5) as follows:

Disposal of small amounts of miscellaneous vegetation products outside established harvest areas, such as Christmas trees, wildings, floral products (ferns, boughs, etc.), cones, seeds, and personal use firewood.
