Western Singer to perform at Oregon Trail Interpretive Center

Baker City, Ore. – Award winning western singer Mary Kaye is bringing her “Spirit of the West” program to the Oregon Trail Interpretive Center on August 6th and 7th.

Mary Kaye has won recognition from the Western Music Association, the Academy of Western Artists, and Western Writers of America for her recordings and live performances. Her program combines original compositions, stories, and covers of classic western songs that define the people, history, culture and landscapes of the American west.

On Saturday, August 6th, Mary Kaye will perform in the evening at the Center’s outdoor amphitheater from 6:00 to 8:00 PM. Cost is \$5.00, with all proceeds going to the Trail Tenders non-profit organization to support educational programs at the Interpretive Center.

On Sunday August 7th, she will perform at 11:00, 12:30 and 2:00 indoors in the Center’s Leo Adler Theater, as part of general admission to the Interpretive Center.

The National Historic Oregon Trail Interpretive Center is located five miles east of Baker City, Oregon on Highway 86. Take Exit 302 from I-84. The Center is currently open 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. daily. Admission for adults is \$8.00 and it’s \$4.50 for seniors; children 15 and under are admitted for free. Federal passes are accepted.

The BLM manages more than 245 million acres of public land, the most of any Federal agency. This land, known as the National System of Public Lands, is primarily located in 12 Western states, including Alaska. The BLM also administers 700 million acres of sub-surface mineral estate throughout the nation. The BLM’s mission is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of America’s public lands for the use and enjoyment of present and future generations. In Fiscal Year 2015, the BLM generated \$4.1 billion in receipts from activities occurring on public lands.
