## What is a Landscape?

"a landscape is as an area encompassing an interacting mosaic of ecosystems and human systems characterized by a set of common management concerns. The landscape is not defined by the size of the area, but rather by the interacting elements that are relevant and meaningful in a management context."

600 DM 6 Landscape-Scale Mitigation Policy



## What is a Landscape?

- Grouping of ecosystems and human systems that interact;
- Defined by common management concerns;
- Not defined by the size of the area;

## Landscapes can be small...

#### **West Eugene Wetlands**

- 1,436 acres
- Threatened and endangered species
- Ecological function of wetlands
- Recreation and environmental education






## Landscapes can be large...

#### **California Desert**

- 22.5 million acres
- Renewable energy development
- Threatened and endangered species
- Recreation
- Cultural areas



## Landscape-scale Planning

- Plan area is defined by management concerns, where practical;
- Encourages cross-boundary coordination and partnerships;
- Aims for edge-matching of decisions;
- Considers multiple landscapes and multiple scales (i.e. multi-scale management).





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














## **Plan Boundary**

#### 1. First draft is based on the plan evaluation

Scale of the issues and opportunities driving the plan revision

#### 2. Refined based on the planning assessment

- New information on baseline conditions
- Existing strategies and plans
- Coordination with federal, State, tribal, and local governments
- Public envisioning process

## Landscape Approach

- A framework for landscape based management.
- Scientific literature:

- BLM has identified 7 principles to applying a landscape approach.

# Principle 2. Assess environmental, ecological, economic, and social values to identify tradeoffs.


















Principle 6. Use high quality information to inform the process, including the best available science.



# Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA)

- Does the proposed rule conflict with FLPMA?
- Does the proposed rule change BLM's responsibilities for planning under FLPMA?
- Why is the BLM proposing to shorten the public comment period for the draft RMP?





#### **Public Involvement**

"...allow an opportunity for **public involvement** and by regulation shall establish procedures... to give Federal, State, and local governments and the public, adequate notice and opportunity to comment upon and participate in the formulation of plans" (FLPMA Section 202(f))



#### **Public Involvement**

- Provides new opportunities for public involvement
  - Preliminary documents → review and comment
  - Planning assessment → early participation
- Modernizes methods for providing notice
- Broadens collaboration during the development of the draft plan into incremental opportunities for review

#### Coordination

"coordinate the land use inventory, planning and management activities...with the land use planning and management programs of other Federal departments and agencies and of the States and local governments within which the lands are located" (Section 202(c)(9))



#### Coordination

- Planning assessment improves coordination on inventory and data, as well as coordination with non-BLM plans.
- Preliminary alternatives improves coordination on plan development.
- Some coordination provisions have been moved in the regulations.



## Consistency

"The Secretary [of the Interior] shall... assist in resolving to the extent practical, inconsistencies between Federal and non-Federal Government plans... land use plans... shall be consistent with State and local plans to the maximum extent he finds consistent with Federal law and the purposes of this Act" (Section 202(c)(9))



## Consistency

- Proposed rule matches FLPMA language, affirming BLM's responsibilities under FLPMA to seek consistency with State and local land use plans.
- Revises provisions that are confusing, lack clear definition, or frequently misinterpreted.
- Consistency applies to decisions, coordination applies to the processes that lead to decisions.

#### **NEPA Compliance for the Rule**

- Why is the BLM using a categorical exclusion (CX) for the planning rule?
  - The proposed rule addresses the planning procedures.
  - Resource management plans are subject to NEPA,
     as are any subsequent site-specific decisions.
  - The preamble to the proposed rule describes potential impacts of changing the planning procedures.



#### **Categorical Exclusion**

Policies, directives, regulations and guidelines that are of an administrative, financial, legal, technical, or procedural nature; or whose environmental effects are too broad, speculative, or conjectural to lend themselves to meaningful analysis and will later be subject to the NEPA process, either collectively or case-bycase (43 CFR 46.210(i)).
