The NYCALC is a is a week-long student environmental conference for Native American, Alaskan Native, and Pacific Islander high and college school students interested in environmental issues, natural resource conservation, community leadership and public service. The program brings native youth from around the nation, Alaska, and Pacific islands to help them become conservation leaders with the skills, knowledge, and tools to address climate change and conservation challenges to better serve their schools and home communities. Also, NYCALC offers mini-grants to students to implement conservation projects in their communities. See https://nycalc.org for more information.

The Junior Faculty members will assist the staff and mentors with the various activities, workshops, and events during the conference. Duties include some of the following: monitoring and mentoring students, facilitating the student lead presentations, public speaking, and assisting staff at the career fair and cultural night. Junior Faculty will also assist students in conservation work-crew projects replanting trees, clearing trails, or working in the nursery. In the past, Junior Faculty have been asked to assist staff during fishing trips and the river rafting trips. Junior Faculty will also attend their own workshops focusing on careers and internships.

Students will need to commit to the week of June 26 to July 1 to attend the conference. Travel days will be June 25 and July 1 with a possibility to visit the Department of Interior Headquarters in Washington, DC on July 1. The BLM will pay for their housing, food, travel, and travel expenses for the conference. There will be at least two zoom meetings Junior Faculty must attend before the conference. Participants must also follow all Department of Interior and the US Fish and Wildlife Service National Conservation Training Center's COVID-19 rules, regulations, and guidelines.
