

WELCOME TO CATTLE POINT!

On the southern tip of San Juan Island, Cattle Point offers sweeping vistas of rugged, sandy bluffs, nearby islands, and the Strait of Juan de Fuca. The stunning backdrop makes the Cattle Point Lighthouse one of the most photographed lighthouses in Washington State. Recreational activities include hiking, picnicking, fishing, sea kayaking, watching wildlife, or viewing wildflowers. The area boasts abundant wildlife, including deer, eagles, butterflies, foxes, and sea otters.



KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- **ACCESSIBILITY** Cattle Point is available for day-use only.
- PARKING is limited.
- **CROWDS** The site can be somewhat crowded during the peak use of the summer; visitors can enjoy more solitude during the shoulder seasons.
- **TREAD LIGHTLY** Please stay on designated trails to protect sensitive wildlife habitat.
- **PETS** are ALLOWED but must be LEASHED (max. 6 feet). Please dispose all pet waste in trash receptacles.

DIRECTIONS

From the ferry terminal at Friday Harbor on San Juan Island, take Spring Street for a half-mile. Turn left onto Mullis Street, which in about one mile becomes Cattle Point Road. Continue for about 8 miles, travelling past American Camp, and the Cattle Point is on the right. Additional parking is available nearby at the Cattle Point Interpretive Center.

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CATTLE POINT LIGHTHOUSE
