The Interpretive Center is closed while we prepare for major renovations starting in 2022 to reduce energy consumption and increase efficiency. Improvements include a new roof, exterior siding, insulation, windows, doors, and HVAC system.

The exhibits and museum objects on display must be safeguarded during the renovation. Our staff is busy packing and removing artifacts and exhibits and placing them in storage.




## Staying healthy on the trail

Wagon trains had to work together to survive the perilous crossing. Pioneers faced many dangers along the way. Disease, starvation, and injuries would kill one in ten of those who made the journey.

Pioneers worked as a community to avoid illness. During your visit, we ask that you work with us to limit the spread of COVID-19.


Wagon wheels were 36 inches across. Please stay two wagon wheels apart.





Pioneers wore bandanas to avoid breathing in dust. Today we wear masks to stop the spread of disease.

When pioneers got sick, the wagon train stopped until they were well. If you feel sick, stay home and rest.





Pioneers did not know washing hands with soap could protect them from disease. Today, we use soap and hand sanitizer to help us stay healthy.
