
## Weeding Out the Words

- 1. Even if you try to cut down invasive plants, many can do this, so they are very hard to get rid of!
- 3. Many invasive plants' seeds, like the dandelion, are transported by this so it can spread all over!
- 5. Term used for a plant that is growing where it is not wanted
- 9. A term used for plants for decorative purposes. Some of these plants took well to new land and became invasive.
- 10. Some of the first invasive plants' seeds were brought over in the ballasts of these
- 13. Some invasive plants, like bedstraw, have seeds like this material that helps them stick to passersby and spread
- 14. Like invasive weeds are so good at doing, you should do this with your new knowledge of invasive weeds to help prevent them from taking over!
- 16. Sometimes these may be applied to invasive plants to stop them from growing and spreading
- 17. Area where a plant or animal lives
- 18. Many invasive plants are not perennial, but this, enabling them to suck up all the nutrients and water from the soil that the perennial native plants need
- 19. This invasive plant was brought here intentionally for its delicious fruits we all love to pick, but then it started taking over the habitat of other plants!
- 21. These types of plants are from the area and often have certain types of habitats in which they grow
- 23. Often invasive plants can be found along this as it creates an unnatural boundary and disturbed area, and it tends to be polluted along this, too, from all the cars!
- 27. Some people use these animals, which eat anything!, to eat up invasive plants that are on their property, and even to "mow" their grass!

- 2. This invasive plant has thorns around it that can puncture the tires of your bike, and help it latch on to things so it can spread
- 4. Sometimes people help out to get rid of invasive weeds, giving up their free time to help take care of our public lands. These people are called...
- 6. When an invasive weed is labeled by the BLM, it is also this type of weed (it sounds like a word you might call your brother or sister!)
- 7. Some invasive plants spread thousands of these in one season!
- 8. These types of plants steal nutrients from their host plant
- 10. This type of soil can be poisonous to many plants, so many rare plants are found in this type of soil in this area
- 11. Many invasive plants seeds lay "sleeping," waiting for the time to sprout. This is called...
- 12. This type of weed is not native to the area and takes over the habitat of native plants, encroaching on economical and recreational activities
- 15. Invasive weed species are able to out-compete native species because they have several of these that help them to survive and reproduce

- 20. Some invasive plants have very deep roots so they can reach water from far down in the earth and survive times of...
- 22. Term used for invasive plants that stick to animals or people in order to "catch a ride" to a new location
- 24. Invasive plants have an easier time out-competing native plants in these types of areas
- 25. Term used by BLM when they want to "get rid of" a noxious weed
- 26. Type of removal that includes pulling plants out with your hands, digging up plants, etc.
