Subject: RAC Public Comment

I could not make it back to the RAC meetings yesterday or today. Would you please offer a couple of brief comments for me? Sorry it's "rough" in form ...

"The BLM RACs can be a valuable and meaningful tool for communicating ideas and advice up the chain of command on decisions being made about the management of public lands (i.e. BLM managed lands and resources). As you heard on Monday, the communication from the RAC is most effectively done in the form of resolutions that BLM managers can use to more effectively communicate to BLM leadership, even in Washington, DC. As such, please consider a resolution today to urge the BLM leadership to very carefully recognize that there are differences between eastern perceptions and what public lands and resources exist in the west and how they have been successfully managed over the years. Also, that western federal lands are diverse, including BLM public lands (including mineral resources), National Forests, National Parks, National Monuments, etc.) and are managed, including protections and uses in compliance with FLPMA, MUSYA, etc. Not all public lands and forests are available for use, but those that are should remain available for appropriate, permitted uses like mineral development and grazing, for example. It seems that in recent years, however, that the land management rules (including varied uses) is being forced to only land preservation, as if all lands should be managed as parks or preserves and ignore the many valuable resources that should also be available to the American public. Also recognize that in the west that these federal resources have often been the reason that many communities were developed and exist today. Their existence is being threatened by these DC driven

rule changes. These communities/ these real people/ these families matter and need to be recognized as these rule changes are being considered in DC."
