Why we plan

The land use planning process is the primary avenue for BLM managers and the public to determine appropriate multiple uses on the public lands.

Our Resource Management Plans (RMPs) form the foundation for how uses and conservation of public lands will be managed into the future.





How we Plan

- We are committed to:
 - Involving our partners,
 - Incorporating local knowledge,
 - Avoiding duplication of efforts, and
 - Building better-informed decisions
- This helps us implement federal law while seeking consistency with local and state laws, policies, plans, needs and values.



Reviewing our approach

- Our new and revised RMPs generally share several strengths:
 - The collaborative approach involves the broad spectrum of interested publics.
 - They provide locally-developed support for the majority of our day-to-day management actions.
 - They establish allocations upfront.
 - Our planning approach fulfills NEPA requirements.

We want to:

- Conduct planning across landscapes at multiple scales and clearly define the boundaries for different types of decisions.
- Create a more dynamic and durable planning process that is responsive to change, keeping plans current through amendments.
- Create an efficient planning process that reduces the amount of time it takes to complete RMPs.

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Where to next?

- We anticipate proposing targeted changes to our planning regulations. These changes will be open for formal public review and comment.
- We also will be revising our current planning handbook to bring it up to date and incorporate changes needed to help us plan across boundaries at multiple scales.
- These changes will not affect existing plans.
