BLM White Mountains National Recreation Area Artist in Residence Program Winter/Spring 2017

The BLM Artist-in-Residence Program (AiR) is founded on the belief that, because artists look closely at the way the world works, notice things that others may have missed, challenge ideas, and create in a variety of forms, they can provide new ways to look at and appreciate public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Artists see beauty and value in the natural places that are promised to future generations of Americans by the management practices of the BLM. Artists can help us to share the scenic beauty and unique stories of BLM-managed land with the public through the world of art. AiR provides artistic and educational opportunities that promote deeper understanding and dialogue about the natural, cultural, and historic resources on public lands.

The Artist-In-Residence program at BLM offers writers, composers, and visual and performing artists the opportunity to pursue their artistic discipline amid Alaska's inspiring landscape. Selected artists will stay in one of the rustic cabins in the White Mountains National Recreation Area cabin/trail system. The BLM provides transportation between Fairbanks and the cabin, but artists are responsible for transportation to Fairbanks.

White Mountain National Recreation Area

Located just an hour outside of Fairbanks, the White Mountains National Recreation Area offers more than 240 miles of maintained winter trails and 12 public recreation cabins surrounded by jagged limestone mountains and cliffs, high mountain passes, and broad, rounded valleys. Imagine having the opportunity to enjoy the solitude, allowing your creativity to take flight. You'll find crisp, clean air, dazzling views, and shimmering northern lights against a star-studded sky.

Artist Selection

The BLM's White Mountains National Recreation Area Artist in Residence Program is committed to supporting artistic efforts from all mediums that support the public lands. Each year the program selects one proposal for the artist in residence. The process of selecting each year's artist(s) in residence is a collaborative one. A jury panel of arts community members as well as BLM employees reviews all complete and on-time applications with a set of questions in mind (see next page). The applications are ranked by each member to facilitate discussion. The final selection is reached by consensus. Artists must be 18 and over.

Artwork Donations

Participating artists are asked to donate to the BLM the use of an original piece of artwork from their residency in the White Mountains National Recreation Area. The artist will retain both the original and the copyright. The BLM is especially interested in artwork relevant to its mission. Artwork may be used in exhibits and for educational purposes. In addition artwork may be used by non-profit partners for items such as postcards, posters, and similar items.

The BLM White Mountains National Recreation Area Artist in Residence Committee is committed to supporting artistic efforts from all mediums that support the preservation of recreational opportunities on public lands in a natural setting. Each year the Committee selects one proposal for the Artist in Residence patrol. The process of selecting each year's artist(s) in residence is a collaborative one. Each committee member reviews all complete and on-time applications with the questions below in mind. The applications are ranked by each member to facilitate discussion. The committee then meets and discusses each member's top-ranked applications. Committee members may bring any application into the discussion. The final selection is reached by consensus.

- What is the level of benefit offered to White Mountains National Recreation Area, and the BLM?
- How strong is the artistic sample?
- How much artistic experience does the applicant have?
- How qualified and pertinent are the reference providers and what do they have to say?
- Does the candidate have a sufficient level of backcountry experience and knowledge of Alaska to safely complete the residency?
- Has a previous artist in residence done a similar project recently?
- Has a previous artist in residence used a similar media recently? If yes, is the proposal unique?
