<u>Arizona</u>

Arizona Site Steward Program

This program was established in 1988 and is administered by the Arizona State Parks Department on behalf of participating agencies and tribes. It has approximately 800 trained volunteers who have contributed more than 100,000 hours monitoring archaeological and historic sites on lands of all jurisdictions throughout Arizona, to detect and deter theft and vandalism. On BLM-administered lands alone, stewards visited 2,200 sites and contributed more than 7,000 hours in the last two years. In addition to monitoring sites, Arizona Site Stewards may assist the BLM heritage professionals in mapping sites, recording rock art, building protective fences around sites, and field surveys. <u>California</u>

California Archaeological Sites Stewardship Program

The California Archaeological Sites Stewardship Program (CASSP) was established by the Society for California Archaeology in 1999. Since then, approximately 800 people have participated in CASSP workshops to become volunteers. The partnership protects cultural resources affected by use of Off Highway Vehicles and other activities. It assists Federal land managing agencies balance cultural resources while providing recreation opportunities. The trained and supervised volunteers monitor over 225 archaeological and historic sites and have contributed over 8,000 hours. The program is a nonprofit professional society and is funded by Off Highway Vehicle grants through the BLM, in-kind contributions from the BLM, other organizations, and individuals. The Nevada State Historic Preservation Officer has created a full-time, permanent position for a statewide Site Steward Program Coordinator who hosts at least four annual training sessions. In the BLM Carson City District alone, there are over 70 site stewards monitoring about 60 sites under the direction of two volunteer regional coordinators who have contributed more than 1,400 volunteer hours over the past five years. New Mexico Site Watch

The New Mexico Site Watch Program is a partnership among land managing agencies, including the BLM, and other entities and is coordinated by the New Mexico Division of Historic Preservation. A site steward's primary tasks are to regularly visit local cultural sites to monitor and report on their condition. Reports provide land managers with crucial information about the condition of the resources, allowing volunteers to make a real contribution to the protection of New Mexico's cultural resources. In the process, they visit places most people only read about. With advanced levels of training, stewards also may assist agency archaeologists with pedestrian surveys for new sites, monitoring construction and other project activities close to known sites that could be damaged. Old Spanish Trail Association Trail Steward Program
