The Archaeological Institute of America (AIA) is organizing International Archaeology Day to be held on October 19, 2013. For the past two years, this event was celebrated as National Archaeology Day; however, with a total of eight countries participating last year we felt it was appropriate to change the name. Last year, we were honored to have the BLM join as one of 125 Collaborating Organizations. Participation spanned 49 U.S. states, 8 Canadian provinces, and six additional foreign countries as approximately 60,000 people participated in nearly 300 events.

The Archaeological Institute of America, founded in 1879, is North America's oldest and the world's largest organization devoted to the world of archaeology. The Institute's mission is to promote a vivid and informed public interest in the cultures and civilizations of the past, support archaeological research, foster the sound professional practice of archaeology, advocate for the preservation of the world's archaeological heritage, and represent the discipline in the wider world.
