Create Your Own Field Guide

A field guide is a book with pictures and descriptions that help you identify the plants and animals you find outside. Explore your yard or a nearby natural space and create your own field guide of what lives there.

Directions

- 1. Prepare your field guide by printing the cover and multiple copies of the observation page.
- 2. Go outside and record observations about the different living things you find. Include:
 - Name: What type of plant or animal is it? If you do not know the species, use your notes to look it up later.
 - Time & Date: When did you observe the plant or animal?
 - Size: How big is it? Use a ruler, or estimate its size.
 - Habitat: Where did you find it? In the woods, on your lawn, perched in a tree?
 - Drawing & Description: Draw a picture of the living thing. Include as much detail as you can. Make notes about additional details you notice.


- Printout of field guide pages, or paper to make your own
- Colored pencils, crayons, or markers




