

Square Foot Safari

Focusing your attention on a very small area can turn up all sorts of interesting surprises. What might you find in one square foot at your feet?

Directions

- 1. Go outside to an interesting natural area. Consider a forest, garden, or simply your backyard.
- 2. Use a ruler and some rocks, sticks, or string to mark out a square that is one foot on each side (one square foot).
- 3. Make a list of everything you can see on the surface of your area.



- 4. Look a little deeper! Start picking through the leaf litter or whatever else is at the surface to find out what other things are there. Write notes about what you find on a piece of paper or in your nature journal.
- 5. When you're finished, carefully replace everything you moved so that the area looks as untouched as possible.

Materials

- Ruler
- Sticks or string to mark out one square foot
- Pencil and paper
- Magnifying glass, small trowel, nature journal (optional)

Questions

- How many different types of plants did you find?
- What new things did you notice when you looked deeper?
- Did you find any insects or worms in your square? Where did you find them?
- 6. If you want, repeat steps 1-5 in another area. How do your two study areas compare?
