Recreation Fee Program Spending & Accomplishment Highlights 2021

Lake Havasu Shoreline

Lake Havasu Field Office (LHFO) manages 73 boat-in campsites along Lake Havasu's shoreline. Park rangers maintain campsites, provide visitor services, outreach, and education, and ensure compliance with regulations to protect resources and safety. Fee revenue (\$96,000.00) was used to purchase a new maintenance boat to facilitate upkeep of the shoreline campsites (i.e., picnic tables, restrooms, BBQ grills, shade ramadas, trash collection, vegetation and weed control, and fee tube maintenance).

LHFO has an array of day-use sites and overnight campsites available for the public to use. BLM has used recreation fee revenue collected (\$23,400.00) from these sites in FY21 to provide upgraded amenities for the public to enjoy. Fees collected have been used to purchase 200 fifty-five-gallon steel drum trashcans, 16 picnic tables, and 30 BBQ grills.

Recreation Fee Dollars

Recreation fee dollars are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations benefit as 100% of the funds collected are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.

They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreation Direct operating or capital costs associated with the recreation fee program




Other Accomplishments

- Monitoring, preparing, and managing Special Recreation Permits for the LHFO

Lake Havasu Field Office is dedicated to providing the best possible recreational experience while also protecting the areas surrounding natural resources. Recreation is a major program for the Lake Havasu's 10 million annual visitors. In addition to water sports, visitors can enjoy hiking, biking, camping, rockhounding, wildlife viewing, hunting, fishing, and off-highway vehicle adventures. Five wilderness areas and one wilderness study area provide opportunities for solitude and enjoyment. Additionally, the field office manages five Areas of Critical Environmental Concern, one river segment suitable for Wild and Scenic River Designation, and one backcountry byway. Lake Havasu Field Office is honored to partner with multiple community organizations (i.e., local off-road groups, boating clubs, and trail organizations) to make the benefits of recreation more accessible to communities while supporting local social, economic, and environmental goals.
