### Fourmile Canyon Campground

Fourmile Canyon Campground is located among large mesquite trees and desert grasses. The campground is open year-round and includes ten campsites with tables, vault toilets, information kiosks, and trash service. Fees generated at the campground were used to fund routine cleaning, pump-outs of vault toilet facilities, and install a new vault toilet for the public. Amount Expended: \$5,000

# Flying "W" Group Site

The Flying "W" is a reservable group site with a large shade pavilion, six picnic tables, four grills, two vault toilets, and two horseshoe pits. It is located along the Gila River within the Gila Box Riparian National Conservation Area. A wind event blew off part of the shade pavilion's steel roof. Fee revenue was used to repair and reinforce the roof and provide routine cleaning and pump-outs of the vault toilet facilities. Amount Expended: \$1,800

# **Recreation Fee Dollars**

They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreationDirect operating or capital costs associated with the recreation fee program

Recreation fee dollars are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations benefit as 100% of the funds collected are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.



# Other Accomplishments

- Purchased campground supplies such as trash bags, hand sanitizer, safety equipment, signs, and toilet paper
- Funded campground hosts, tools, materials, and supplies to help ensure fee compliance from visitors, provide interpretive information, and assist in the overall operations and maintenance of the site
- Continued annual maintenance site support
- Processed all-new Special Recreation Permit (SRP) applications and expiring permit renewals

# Connecting with Communities

The Safford Field Office (SFO) facilitates meaningful connections with visitors to BLM-managed lands by utilizing recreation fee revenue. FO collects fees under the FLREA to help keep infrastructure and visitor services programs up-to-date and relevant, promoting responsible recreation, shared stewardship, and a positive image of the agency. Fees generated through the SRP program enhance the SFO's ability to process commercial permits in a timely manner. Specifically, visitors benefit from clean trailhead and restroom facilities and up-to-date transportation system kiosks and signs. Local youth benefit from instruction and job-related experience conducting patrols, performing habitat restoration, providing visitor information, and repairing infrastructure. These efforts support many of the goals identified in the BLM National Recreation Strategy: Connecting with Communities.
