Camphost Provides Assistance

Volunteer camphost, Richard Green, returned to the Zunino-Jiggs Campground in the Tuscarora Field Office for his eighth summer in Fiscal Year 2021. Green cleans restrooms, does light maintenance such as painting picnic tables, and patrols the campground, answering questions that visitors pose. "I like to stay busy and work with my hands," says Richard Green. Richard receives a small reimbursement paid through the BLM's Recreation Use Permit fees for camping and day-use at the campground.

Fence Repair Post Fire

Fence repair supports the multiple-use mission.

The Sugarloaf Fire tore through the North Wildhorse Campground in September 2019. All work to open the campground was done, except for the fence around the perimeter. A half-mile segment of the fence was repaired and replaced using dollars from Recreation Use Permit fees collected at the North Wildhorse campground in the Tuscarora Field Office. This fence helps protect the multiple-use mission by allowing grazing, recreation, and sensitive riparian areas to coexist in the Recreation Area.

Recreation Fee Dollars

Recreation fee dollars are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations benefit as 100% of the funds collected are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value. They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreationDirect operating or capital costs associated with the recreation fee program



Other Accomplishments

- Painting of picnic tables
- Purchase of Recreation Use Permit (campground envelopes)
- Purchase of hydrostatic sprayer for COVID-19 mitigation while cleaning restrooms
- Garbage Collection costs
- Utilization and repair of vehicle for maintenance work and fee collection
