Bruneau River

The Bruneau River is a Wild and Scenic River that provides outstanding recreation opportunities for experienced boaters who are seeking a technical and remote experience. There are four commercial outfitters that are permitted to operate on the Bruneau. Most of the fee funds generated from special recreation permits in the Jarbidge Field Office come from commercial use on the Bruneau and Jarbidge Rivers, with majority of that use being on the Bruneau.

The Bruneau Canyon Overlook sits at the edge of the Bruneau Canyon adjacent to the Bruneau-Jarbidge Rivers Wilderness Area. It provides ADA access to the canyon rim with two different paved paths and viewing platforms. Visitors can look down into the deep canyon and see the stretch of rapids called Five Mile Rapids. The site also has a vault restroom, some dirt trails, interpretive panels, stone benches, a safety fence along the rim, and a fence around the site itself.

Recreation Fee Dollars

They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreation
- Direct operating/capital costs associated with the recreation fee program

Recreation fee dollars are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations benefit as 100% of the funds collected are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.



Other Accomplishments

\$25,488.77 in fee funds went to the Shoshone Field Office to assist with Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation grant for the Wilson Lake Recreation Site.
