

### Campground Restructure



New Shoup Bridge Campground amenities installed.

Shoup Bridge Campground was restructured to accommodate more day-use and boat trailer parking. There is increased use from rafters using the boat ramp to access the Salmon River. The campground was repaved with asphalt and the parking spaces striped. New steel picnic tables, fire rings, trash receptacles, and benches were also added. This project was in conjunction with the construction of the Highway 93 South Trail, a paved nonmotorized trail from the town of Salmon to Shoup Bridge Campground with the assistance of a DOT FLAP grant. Amount Expended: \$66,600.00

### A Good Foundation

The Salmon Field Office is currently constructing Tarpons Roost, a new facility to increase recreation opportunities adjacent to the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail and the Lewis & Clark National Historic Trail. The concrete foundation has been poured for the new shelter and an external drain system has been installed to help remove snowmelt runoff in the spring from the high elevation site. Construction will continue in 2023 when snow levels recede and allow access to the site.

Amount Expended: \$18,000.00

## Recreation Fee Dollars

They support and enhance:

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife-dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreation
- Direct operating/capital costs associated with the recreation fee program



### Other Accomplishments

- A bicycle repair station, bike rack, and kiosk were added to Shoup Bridge Campground as part of the Highway 93 South Trail.
- 15 dead or dying cottonwood trees were removed from Shoup Bridge Campground increasing visitor safety.
- Broken water spigot was excavated and replaced at McFarland Campground providing camp host with potable drinking water.
- Two campgrounds were maintained by summer seasonal camp hosts increasing visitor satisfaction.
- Informational signs about native tribes' historic use of hot springs were installed at Sharkey Hot Springs.

### **Planned Activities**

McFarland Campground will be expanded, and four additional campsites will be created with RV parking pads. The campground will also receive new picnic tables, fire rings, trash receptacles, and the broken camp host electrical pedestal will be replaced. \$34,000

McFarland Campground's potable water system needs to be replaced to fix leaks in the system and keep the potable water available for campers. \$20,000

Construction will continue at Tarpons Roost along the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail and the Lewis & Clark Historic Trail. \$20,000
