Fishing Line recycling stations were installed

Tabor Creek is a hot spot for anglers in Northern Nevada. All of those anglers come with a ton of fishing line. Sometimes all that line gets tangled, and it could get left behind creating a bad experience for wildlife or the next angler. The fishing line recycling stations provide a way for the BLM and the public to work together to properly dispose of that pesky line and keep Tabor Creek's beauty intact.

Amount Expended: \$439.00

New amenities at Tabor Creek!



Garbage collection brings extra benefits!

Tabor Creek Campground enhanced its amenities to include garbage collection. Campers now have the option to drop their trash in the new bin instead of hauling it out. This bin has not only elevated the campground benefits but also has reduced fugitive garbage being left in bathrooms and campsites.

Recreation Fee Dollars

They support and enhance:

Recreation fee dollars are an investment in outdoor recreation. Current and future generations benefit as 100% of the funds collected are reinvested in the facilities and services that visitors enjoy, use, and value.

- Maintenance, repair, and facility enhancement related directly to visitor enjoyment, visitor access, and health and safety
- Interpretation, visitor information, visitor service, visitor needs assessments, and signs
- Habitat restoration directly related to wildlife- dependent recreation that is limited to hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, or photography
- Law enforcement related to public use and recreation
- Direct operating/capital costs associated with the recreation fee program



Other Accomplishments

All picnic tables and the interiors of all the CXT's were painted at Tabor Creek Campground.

Tabor Creek was mowed and Weed abatement was accomplished in coordination with District Weeds Crew.

Trafx counters were installed to collect valuable visitor use data.

Monofilament (fishing line) recycling centers were installed at key access points along Tabor Creek.

Recreation funds collected in 2022 will be expended in FY 2023. Featured projects include:

- Garbage Collection (\$1,600)
- Annual maintenance (\$1,500)
- Supplies: Toilet paper (\$198.76) and hand sanitizer (\$131.59)
- Beaver deterrents/tree protection (\$650)
- Fishing line recycling stations (\$450)
- Pumping of CXT Vault Toilets (\$2,750)
