Actions Matter

Please Follow Fire Prevention Tips

Tip#1: Keep your vehicle maintained, mufflers secure, tires inspected and safety chains crossed and off the ground. One spark from dragging metal can cause a wildfire.

Tip#2: Remember to extinguish your campfire every time you leave camp. Drown your fire with water, stir and feel it to ensure it is cold.

Tip#3: Don't drive or park on dry grass! Vehicle exhaust systems can reach up to 1,000 degrees and can easily start a wildfire in tall dry grasses.

Tip#4: Possession and discharge of fireworks is prohibited on public lands.



Vehicle Travel

- Drive on established roads only.
- Do not block traffic, roads must be passable to other vehicles.
- Be alert to wildlife on roadways, especially at dusk and at night.
- Allow yourself extra time due to traffic
- Motor Vehicle Use Maps (MVUM) are available online or the Avenza App.
- GPS is NOT always reliable, cell phone service can be spotty.

Leave No Trace: Outdoor Ethics



- Travel and camp on durable spaces
- Dispose of waste properly—know where your dump stations are: http://bit.ly/2sKavNm
- Leave what you find
- Minimize campfire impacts
- Respect wildlife
- Be considerate of other visitors
- Pack it in. Pack it out.

Eye Safety

- Don't forget to pick up a pair of eclipse glasses before heading into the backcountry.
- Do not attempt to observe the partial or annular phases of any eclipse with the naked eye. Failure to use appropriate filtration may result in permanent eye damage or blindness!

What is a Total Solar Eclipse?

An astronomical event when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, and the Moon fully blocks the Sun. You can only see the complete eclipse within the lines of totality.

Date of the Eclipse: August 21, 2017

Time of the Eclipse:

Partial Phase Start: 10:15 a.m. Start of Totality: 11:33 a.m. (101 seconds) End of Total Eclipse: 11:35 a.m.

BLM Developed Campgrounds

- BLM reservable campgrounds are currently booked.
- All other BLM campgrounds operate under a first-come, first-serve basis with a 14-day limit.
- Established campgrounds require fees.
- Bring water.

Undeveloped Camping on Public Land

- Dispersed camping is free
- 14 day stay limit
- No pit toilets at sites
- Bring water
- Stay on designated routes and trails
- The South Fork and Henry's Fork of the Snake River corridors are subject to 5 day camp limit and requires a fire pan and toilet system
