TODAY: “Secretary Zinke Announces \$32.6 Million in Historic Preservation Grants to States and Tribes

Funds” Offshore Drilling Helps Protect U.S. and Tribal Historic Places, Culture, and Traditions.

WASHINGTON – U.S. Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke with the National Park Service today announced the awarding of \$26.9 million in historic preservation grants to every U.S. state, the District of Columbia, the U.S. territories, and partnering nations, in addition to \$5.7 million in grants to more than 160 tribes for cultural and heritage preservation projects on their tribal lands.

“The Department of the Interior and the National Park Service is committed to preserving U.S. and tribal history and heritage,” Secretary Zinke said. “Through valuable partnerships we are able to assist communities and tribes in ensuring the diverse historic places, culture, and traditions that make our country unique are protected for future generations.”

#### Emergency Management

In Arizona, the Sawmill Fire, which began on April 23 in Pima County, is burning on state, U.S. Forest Service, and Bureau of Land Management Lands. To date, the fire has burned 40,356 acres and is 20-percent contained. The fire is being managed by a Type-2 Incident Management Team (IMT) with 606 personnel assigned, which includes 105 DOI personnel. There are 300 residential structures threatened and 412 evacuees at this time. The containment date has been set for May 3. The fire, beyond residential structures, also threatens community and utility infrastructure.

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occurred, destroying seismic monitoring stations and telemetry equipment installed near the summit crater. At the request of Observatorio Vulcanológico y Sismológico de Costa Rica (OVSICORI), the USGS Volcano Disaster Assistance Program (VDAP) is providing two seismic stations, two Differential Optical Absorption Spectroscopy (DOAS) gas sensors, telemetry equipment to replace the equipment destroyed in the April 25 explosion, and assistance with monitoring efforts.

### **Media of Interest**

#### **Trump Executive Order Directs Zinke To Review National Monument Designations.**

Reuters (4/26, Volcovici) reports that, as “part of an effort to reverse many of the environmental protections implemented by” President Barack Obama, President Trump “signed an executive order to allow national monument designations to be rescinded or reduce the size of sites.” Trump called Obama’s use of the 1906 Antiquities Act to create monuments, in Reuters’ words, “an ‘egregious abuse of federal power’ that allowed the federal government to ‘lock up’ millions of acres of land and water.” Interior Secretary Zinke said he is required by the order to review about 30 national monuments and recommend which designations should be lifted or altered. He added that reversing a monument designation “is untested, as you know, whether the president can do that” and that he would seek input from locals before making recommendations.

The Washington Post (4/26, Eilperin) reports Zinke told reporters that, in the words of the Post, “he would keep an open mind as he scrutinized past monument designations and that in and of itself the order would not repeal any existing monuments.” He said the review will consider any “loss of jobs, reduced wages and reduced public access” due to areas being “put off limits for traditional uses, like farming, ranching, timber harvest, mining, oil and gas exploration, fishing, and motorized recreation.” He added, “By and large, the Antiquities Act and the monuments that we have protected have done a great service to the public and are some of our most treasured lands in this country. . . . Those out in the West would probably say it’s abused.” Zinke also said, “I’m not going to predispose what the outcome is going to be.”
