Proposed Action: Harvest up to 2 cords of firewood at Perhaps Creek near MP 56 Steese highway.

Date of Proposed Action: June 20, 2011 through September 30, 2011

Location: Davidson Ditch, MP 57 Steese Highway

Description of Proposed Action:

Mr. Boehl has applied for a free use wood cutting permit to harvest up to 2 cords of personal use firewood. The proposed harvest site is near mile 56 of the Steese Highway (see attached map). The site is with the boundary of the 2004 wildfire. There are an estimated 40 to 50 cords per acre of fire-killed spruce in the area. Mr. Boehl is proposing to cut only fire-killed trees. All harvested wood will be hand carried to his vehicle on established roads at the site. This permit will expire on 9/30/11.

The proposed action is in conformance with the applicable LUP because it is specifically provided for in the following LUP decision(s):
Forestry Resources section, page 16.

Management Direction: Forest products would be reserved for local use only. No commercial timber harvest would be permitted.

Compliance with NEPA:

The Proposed Action is categorically excluded from further documentation under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in accordance with 516 DM 11.9 (C-5) which states: “Disposal of small amounts of miscellaneous vegetation products outside established harvest areas, such as Christmas trees, wildings, floral products (ferns, boughs, etc.), cones, seeds, and personal use firewood.”

**Decision for Categorical Exclusion DOI-BLM-AK-02000-2011-00XX-CX
for Boehl/Free Use Firewood Permit**

Decision

It is my decision to allow the harvest of up to 2 cords of personal use firewood by Mr. Boehl from the proposed site near Perhaps Creek. The following Forest Harvest Guidelines will be followed to protect other natural and human resources in the area.

Forest Harvest Guidelines:

The following Forest Harvest Guidelines will apply to this action:

1. This permit authorizes the harvest of dead/down/fire-killed trees only. No standing green trees may be harvested.
2. No trees, including down trees, shall be cut within 100 feet of either side of a stream or river.
3. Stumps shall not to exceed six (6) inches above the ground on the high side, recommend flush cutting stumps.
4. Each tree shall be utilized to a top diameter of four (4) inches or less.
5. All tops and branches shall be scattered.
6. All activities must be conducted so as to cause minimal disturbance to ground cover. No surface disturbing activities are authorized under this permit.
7. If any historic or cultural objects are discovered while harvesting firewood, they are to be left in place and reported to BLM.

Rationale

1. This action is in accordance with Goal 3.2 of the White Mountains Resource Management Plan which states: Where compatible with recreation goals, permit multiple uses of resources on land classified as semi-primitive.
2. There are no anticipated impacts to cultural resources. See attachment #1.
3. The Proposed Action will not significantly restrict subsistence uses. See attachment #2.
4. The proposed action is assigned the EFH determination: *No affect*. See attachment #3

Appeal Procedures

This decision may be appealed to the Interior Board of Land Appeals, Office of Hearings and Appeals, in accordance with 43 CFR Part 4 and DOI Form 1842-1. The notice of appeal must be filed in the Bureau of Land Management Eastern Interior Field Office (at the above address) within 30 days from receipt of this decision. Appeals from administrative decisions issued by BLM-Alaska must be filed in writing in the office of the deciding official, either by mail or hand delivery. Notices of appeal transmitted by electronic means, such as facsimile or email, will not be accepted as timely filed.
