Proposed Action: Special Recreation Permit to conduct guided hunting in the National Petroleum Reserve Alaska (NPR-A).

Description of Proposed Action: The applicant, Dave Leonard, of Mountain Monarchs of Alaska (MMA) have requested to renew their authorization for a special recreation permit to conduct guided hunting operations on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lands within in the NPR-A.




Figure 1 Map submitted by applicant

The proposed action would authorize a renewal of a Special Recreation Authorization to MMA to conduct guided hunting trips on BLM managed lands in the vicinity of the Etivluk River on the North Slope of Alaska (Figure 1). The hunts would take place in August and September. Mountain Monarchs would guide between 5 and 20 hunters. Hunters would fly commercially to Bettles and from there they would fly with Brooks Range Aviation to Pac Paddle Lake to MMA's base camp. Clients would hunt either in the vicinity of the lake or fly to an area nearby.

Mr. Leonard has two registered guides that assist with the guided trips. All guides and pilots have satellite phones, EPIRBS, and aircraft handheld radios. Mountain Monarch's operating plan includes the use of a 1955 Piper Supercub. A pit toilet is proposed for human waste. Both Mr. Leonard and his employees have years of experience and have attended safety training. No fuel would be stored on site.

While Mr. Leonard has been conducting this kind of activity since 1985, this would be his second year of holding a BLM SRP. An Environmental Assessment was written for this project in 2010 (DOI-BLM-LLAKF010-2010-0036-EA) with a finding of no significant impact. The proposed action this year would not be different from the 2010 EA.
