



ARIZONA

Dry rocky deserts, plunging cliffs, carved rock canyons, and lush riparian areas draw millions of visitors to BLM Arizona's public lands every year. Providing opportunities to experience solitude and splendor to the public, the National Landscape Conservation System helps to protect some of the nation's most remarkable and rugged landscapes. In Arizona, the system includes national monuments, national conservation areas, wilderness and wilderness study areas, and national historic trails.

5 National Monuments each designated under the authority of the Antiquities Act of 1906, to protect their scientific and historic interests and to ensure long-term management of these places.

3 National Conservation Areas designated by Congress for conservation, protection, enhancement and management of their unique resources for the use, benefit and enjoyment of people now and in the future. These sites have special natural, recreational, cultural, wildlife, aquatic, archaeological, paleontological, historical and scientific values.

For visitors, these diverse national treasures offer a wide sampling of outdoor recreation, prehistoric and geological scenery, and archaeological finds. Home to hundreds of wildlife and plant species, these sites are nature's playground, and the public's too.

47 Wilderness Areas and 2 Wilderness Study Areas designated by Congress to retain their natural character without permanent improvements. They offer outstanding opportunities for solitude and primitive recreation, giving visitors a chance to experience ecological, geological and other scientific, scenic or historical values.


