




Inventoried routes on public land within the field office boundary are numbered on this map. The routes starting with LP were designated in the La Posa Plan and most of them are also numbered on the ground. Numbers that contain "?" need to be coordinated with numbers on the ground (if they exist).

Except only in very specific situations, routes on lands other than public lands were not inventoried. Routes shown on this map, across non-public lands, may or may not be available for use. Check with landowner before accessing.

ROUTE INVENTORY MAPS

These six maps are a catalog of the existing routes found on-the-ground when BLM conducted its inventory (between 1990 and 2004):

- Bullhead
- Havasu
- Cactus Plain
- Alamo
- Bouse
- Wenden

This inventory was published as part of the Lake Havasu Field Office, Draft Resource Management Plan/Draft Environmental Impact Statement on September 30, 2005. The maps were revised based on public input during comment periods, and incorporated into the Lake Havasu Field Office Record of Decision/Approved Resource Management Plan.

With the exception of highways, paved roads, and streets within communities, each route has been located using the Global Positioning System (GPS). Each route was confirmed, by one of the following travel methods: foot, horseback, dirt bike, ATV or 4x4 vehicles. An identifying number was assigned to each route for reference.

Maps include routes previously designated "Closed to Motorized Use" in earlier plans, as well as non-motorized trails. Single Track Trails are defined as routes limited to ATV or smaller sized vehicles, bikes, horseback or foot. "Specialized Vehicle Trails" are defined as routes which contain conditions requiring specialized equipment and skills. Although routes appear on this map, it is not implied these routes are available for standard vehicle use, or that the routes are passable and safe to travel.

These maps display existing routes that may be traveled upon in areas identified as "Limited to Existing Roads and Trails" until the Travel Management Network is completed. Shown on these maps is the inventory of routes, from which the Transportation route network will be determined. Routes created after the ROD/Approved RMP, are illegal and will not be considered during the designation process. See below for more information on the designation process.

WHAT COMES NEXT?

BLM has begun the Travel Management Planning process including public meetings starting in winter of 2006/2007. BLM will gather data, issues, and concerns to be used during the analysis of specific routes on public lands.

The Travel Management Network will designate a network of open, closed, or limited routes to provide reasonable, safe, and environmentally sound access to public lands.

The network will include opportunities for a variety of motorized and non-motorized access needs, and will seek to balance them with other resource values found on public lands.

AZ BLM has adopted the Route Evaluation Tree, (first used in BLM's West Mohave Plan), for designating routes and developing a transportation network. A copy of this tree and a list of basic criteria for evaluation can be found in Appendix A in the ROD/Approved RMP.

The Tree applies a standard analytical method to routes found on this inventory to determine whether they should be part of the Travel Management Network and if any limitations are necessary to protect or enhance recreation, cultural, and natural resources.

LHFO will systematically evaluate the routes in the six Travel Management Units depicted in these six inventory maps. When the evaluation process is complete for a specific unit, the information will be placed on the internet and at public locations (i.e. libraries) for public review and comment. The draft Travel Management Plan will present at least three alternative networks for each unit. The final Travel Management Plan will designate each route, on this inventory as either Open, Limited or Closed to motorized use. The plan will also identify trails which will be open only to non-motorized use. Six access guides showing the approved travel management network of routes will be published to implement the Travel Management Network. These guides will replace these inventory maps.
