Grand Canyon National Park is one of our nation's crown jewels, a uniquely American landscape that represents one of the world's greatest natural wonders. Carved by the Colorado River over millions of years, the canyon provides a haven for abundant fish and wildlife, a destination point for rafters and kayakers and is home to the people of many tribal nations who have lived in the area for hundreds of years. But potential uranium mining at the park's borders endangers the precious resources that attract nearly five million visitors annually.

Best practice mining is to restore the land after mining is complete to its predevelopment state. This can be a successful practice in less ecologically sensitive lands such as prairie and even forested mountains such as the Appalachians, but restoration is impossible in arid lands such as those in many of our National Parks. I am an Arizonan who has spent years living in Southern and Northern Arizona and exploring the wonders of the Grand Canyon and the Colorado Plateau. I have been to many backcountry locations in the state where it is unsafe to drink the little water found there due to past mineral extraction - and more importantly - lack of proper clean up.

Uranium has already been detected in water flowing in tributaries to the Colorado River. This watershed is the most important one in the Western US, hands down. It supports the water needs of over 27 million people. It is utterly unacceptable to consider extraction that in any way would lead to the possibility of aquifer and/or watershed pollution. I support PLAN B that will protect this important watershed and am firmly against uranium extraction in Arizona in any location where leaching into the aquifer or watershed pollution is a possibility.

Mining laws in the US and particularly Arizona are antiquated and do not take into account current public interests. Mining extraction should not take precedent over other values and interests, such as securing water resources, protected area designation, and clear public opinion against mining operations. Mining in Grand Canyon National Park should not be a matter up for discussion, as public opinion has consistently and clearly sided against it.

Comments on EIS

Hi,

My name is Joseph Turner and I reside at 550 S. Blackbird Roost apt # 7, Flagstaff AZ 86001. Thank you for presenting the open house on the potential temporary withdrawal areas near the Grand Canyon, it is important for me, an aspiring environmental scientist, to meet the scientist working on the project. They all sincerely cared about the complexities of the issue, and that makes me feel good. Please note that within my comments (both listed below and contained in the attached word document) the "substantive portions" are within rhetoric that is a naturally part of my argument for making a better document. I can be contacted by email at jat239@nau.edu if there are any needs for clarification, or really just anything pertaining to this issue.

-I am particularly interested in the Honorable Secretary of Interior's characterization of the "...best science available." I am not sure that the best science available can be assembled in these compressed time frames. Also when I surficially analyzed chapter six, I found that less than 20 percent of the articles were from academic sources subject to the level of review deserving the distinction "peer reviewed." Could marks be made next to articles in the reference section to show that the articles have been subject to peer-review?

-Are determinations being made by a scientific consensus, experiments, or some other standard?

From my observation of the agency I would say that it is not always the "...best science available," but what I would call "less than arbitrary" program management standards that try to balance expertise from different disciplines. It is well done, and the scientist are competent, but I think these documents should not just be voluntarily reviewed, they should have to be fully peer reviewed.

-If and when there is a legitimate conflict in view expressed by a researcher, academic, or equivalently qualified cultural expert, over an issue that the agency chooses not to consider or include, could in-text foot- or end-notes refer the reader to as much information as possible? For example, could the public be referred to the researchers, agencies, institutions, and major publications holding the dissenting view, if they are willing to be identified as such? To me this is especially important for only the most crucial assumptions in the document, such as ones that would heavily alter figures for probability of adverse impacts.

-The previous three comments all get to the same point that many feel as these documents try to "wow the public," or make them feel overwhelmed and underqualified to approach the perspective of the authors. Since many in the public will never be formally trained, the extra information such as peer-review standards, information regarding time constraints on studying the issues, and legitimate dissenting

views, being fully and clearly presented will help the public maintain a coherent view of what is sometimes very complicated and contested scientific findings.

-A lot can happen in 20 years, and I think it is CLASSIC that the Director of the EIS claimed, when referring to the stability of the uranium market at the open house, that a major nuclear catastrophe was virtually impossible in today's nuclear practices. This is a great instance of how trends in thinking amongst those with political positions limit the scientific viability of these documents. I understand that many avenues of reasoning may be politically problematic, and maybe even beyond the authority of the law on occasion, but science is not supposed to focus too much on what is sacred, but what is true. Perhaps appendices could be added express some of the more oddball scenarios. I think I was told that they couldn't "speculate," but honestly there are many reasonably foreseeable developments, and they all take a lot of speculation. In fact, isn't speculation a major part of science?

I think most people have a basic understanding of economic markets and it is no secret that they respond to demand. We have assumed that uranium yellowcake will sell for a baseline average of \$40/lb. A pretty fair speculation in my mind, even though that is dwindling by the minute as I learn more and more about the nuclear industry. However, whether or not I think it is a fair speculation is irrelevant. Hard-rock minerals are known to boom and bust, this should be mentioned when explaining the use of a baseline.

-Why not look at all the reasonable scenarios that might cause these mines to be "mothballed?" Specific examples that do not seem so far fetched are: 1) nuclear accidents (especially now, but no less before this month tragedy) 2) hard-rock mining reform bills similar to ones that have passed the house as late as 2008 (there are not that many variations, basically would these mines operate at the 40\$ price if they had to pay royalties) 3) litigation or heavy pressure on local agencies to deny permits (how long are the permits good for and is it possible to be legally embroiled. Even if you can not explore these scenarios, could you develop a generic scenario were the price dropped or the net profitability dropped? The specifics of these scenarios aren't essential, their affect on demand, and thus price, is. Could you publish a predicted figure for the price of uranium that would probably cause a scenario where mining and exploration in the region would stop?

-It would not hurt to express all reasonable possibilities that could affect the region; these impact statements have been notorious for flaws when viewed in hindsight. I know there may be some hesitance to address issues that bring political pressure, but they are not more speculative than thinking these mines wont be run over longer terms than they plan. These mines may contain high grade ore by national standards, but they are low grade to very low grade by international standards (which are more relevant to most of the hardrock mining industry), this should be clearly stated. A program level analysis

should operate with more foresight and historical context; We act as though hardrock mining reform is impossible, and that nuclear accidents are unlikely, but the historical yellowcake price is pretty volatile, and it only takes ONE major nuclear accident anywhere in the world to possibly shake the foundation of this \$40/lb yellowcake price option.

-These pipes are localized and the public would at least like to be better informed. Disclose the exact location of as many of the 30 mine locations, as well as the unavoidable, but not explicitly disclosed "nine mines" that are on the way no matter the decision of the agency on the withdrawals. In other words characterize the science based potential for each possible exploratory sites with an active claim on the exclusion areas that can not be stopped under existing laws, and if they can not be ruled out, please do not estimate a figure of 30 mines (the probabilities of water and air contamination depend on it), cite instead the potential of all valid claims. It seems quite possible figures could grow enormously if there are 1000 sites and say that 15% have economically extractable resources instead of 3%, that could more than double the mining activity here. These deposits have been known to yield more uranium than was previously thought too, so maybe we should error on the side of the miners proceeding at more sites.

-Compare these sites to the potential sites on other than federal public lands and report their location, so that the whole public has an accurate view of why we would allow major increases in mining so close to the Grand Canyon. It is culturally significant, and an important, down-to-earth, way that many people will judge this activity as posing an undue risk.

-Risk management includes risk perception, and this activity will ALWAYS be at odds with Native American culture, even if occasional tribes decide otherwise; maybe the impact statement should elucidate on this very point. In other words, the safety of this activity will always be viewed with skepticism or outright alarmism by the Native American community; perhaps we should protect the character of the region without placing a further burden on our anthropologically significant neighbors sentiments and cultural identity. If a value could be placed on their relationship to the land, I bet it would exceed the potential gains to society from this activity.

-Uranium is a non-renewable resource with dangerous properties, perhaps lasting as long as the human race has been a species. Even with reprocessing, this material is extremely limited when compared to renewable energy resources, and the market has yet to account for its disposal; this should be clearly stated in assumptions for the price and cultural significance. It poses a threat for a very long period of time, and it is important to realize this begins with extraction.

-Though it is portrayed as a source that can be used to ween society off carbon based fuel, there is no support for uranium and nuclear power replacing any carbon based plants. Scaling up production will most likely only be in addition to existing regimes of energy

production, and since there is no immediate need to decrease the price of uranium, because that is probably the most insignificant of nuclear power production capital investments, the only thing driving the mining of this low grade to extremely low grade ore (as included in endowment estimates) is profit for entities that offer a large amount of risk for little benefit. Please do not just state a value of 2.91 billion dollars, please also provide a pie diagram of where the money is distributed.

-The uranium price on the market has yet to internalize the cost of an absent disposal technique, and though the honorable Secretary of Energy is wildly optimistic, it is unfair, irresponsible, and undemocratic for us to move forward aggressively with nuclear energy production, when it is clear that it is a bad move if it is not mandated as a substitute for CO2. Nuclear may or may not offer a responsible path, do not impact northern Arizona, southern Utah, and Native Americans anymore. There are other supplies for this fuel and they should be exhausted first.

The following are my comments about your proposed blockade of uranium and metal/non-metal mining when the U.S. needs these valuable resources.
