I am writing to support Alternative B of the Draft Environmental Impact Statement. I am in favor of protecting one million acres of public lands surrounding Grand Canyon National Park from mining for 20 years, as Alternative B would do. Grand Canyon is renowned for its amazing biological diversity, primarily because it is surrounded by large unpopulated areas, old growth forests, and diverse contiguous habitats. Numerous seeps and springs support wildlife, rare plants, and recreation. It is an area very special to me, my family and millions of Americans.

The area proposed for withdrawal captures the watershed, as well as groundwater that flows toward seeps and springs inside the Park and toward neighboring tribal lands. This water is critical as it eventually flows into the Colorado River, which supplies millions of people with drinking water. These facts make it an even more important place to protect.

I am writing this personalized letter to express my support Alternative B, the Proposed Action, from the Grand Canyon uranium mining DEIS. Please - in the name of all that is sane, sacred, and reasonable - withdraw these lands from mining for an additional twenty years.

Tourism - not uranium mining - is the Grand Canyon region's main economic driver. Grand Canyon National Park generates \$687 million annually in direct, indirect and induced revenues, and contributes to the creation of more than 290,000 tourism-related jobs in the state. The BLM over-inflates revenue projections in the first place, and does not reveal at all that most of those revenues go to Utah or overseas. Uranium mining and its inevitable contamination and industrialization threatens the livelihoods of local residents for temporary profits for foreign companies. Uranium mining poses both long and short-term health risks on local communities - have you seen the news from Japan, both now and since 1945? I assume you have. Uranium mining is also still costing American taxpayers billions of dollars to clean up the devastation from the last (that is "previous", and hopefully the LAST) uranium boom.

1. Uranium mining (despite the claims made by mining companies) leads to contamination of soil, surface water and ground waters that drain into the Colorado River, which is protected by law and supplies drinking water to 25 million people.
2. Uranium mining (again, despite the claims made by mining companies, and again illegally) results in the desecration of sacred sites for Havasupai, Hualapai, Kaibab Paiute, Zuni, Hopi, and Navajo people.
3. Uranium mining (illegally and blatantly) harms condors and other federally protected Rare, Threatened and Endangered species.

Former Grand Canyon National Park Superintendent Steve Martin had these words: "There should be some places that you just do not mine. Uranium is a special concern because it is both a toxic heavy metal and a source of radiation. I worry about uranium escaping into the local water, and about its effect on fish in the Colorado River at the bottom of the gorge, and on the bald eagles, California condors and bighorn sheep that depend on the Canyon's seeps and springs. More than a third of the Canyon's species would be affected if water quality suffered." These places are protected under law for the benefit of all, including future generations and the entire world (Grand Canyon is also a World Heritage Site, after all).

The area proposed for withdrawal captures the watershed, as well as groundwater that flows toward seeps and springs inside the Park and toward neighboring tribal lands. This water is critical as it eventually flows into the Colorado River, which supplies millions of people with drinking water. When we run out of clean, safe drinking water in the arid West, where shall we turn? We cannot drink uranium, and I doubt if the mining companies will provide anyone with reliable, safe water.

Tens of millions of our taxpayer dollars are already being spent to clean up abandoned uranium mines, mills, and dumps in the Grand Canyon region, while hundreds of abandoned mines continue to pollute the air and water. We should not risk Grand Canyon waters and wildlife, the public health, or the cost for future cleanups.

Please do not fail in your obligation to the American and international public; please do not fail in your legal duties; please do not fail in your responsibility to protect and preserve our natural heritage. Please support Alternative B and withdraw these lands from mining for an additional twenty years.

Drilling wells is likely to result in unsustainable aquifer depletion and the piercing of perched aquifers., causing seeps and springs to dry up. The Grand Canyon ecoregion is an arid environment, and these oasis are vital to the biodiversity of the Canyon. Loss of these seeps and springs would have a significant impact on the viability and distribution of populations of species dependent on the seeps and springs.

*Water quality is also threatened by uranium mining. Uranium becomes more soluble when oxidized, and breccia pipes are conduits to groundwater, Uranium, aluminum, and other contaminants are likely to increase in ground and surface water, and we have absolutely no way to clean up groundwater. These contaminants will enter the food chain, and bioaccumulation could result in serious harm to some species.

*Land clearing and road building are likely to disrupt wildlife, fragment habitats, and push wildlife into marginal habitats. This could have significant impacts on deer, elk, and pronghorn populations.

I value the Grand Canyon for its scenic beauty, amazing biodiversity, and clean environment. It is a national and international treasure that can only be harmed by uranium mining. I thank Secretary Salazar for proposing the twenty year withdrawal of the over one million acres from mining.
