Subject: Transmittal of the New Reclamation and Sustainable Mineral
Development Awards Program

The subject awards program was previously announced to the field in Washington Office Instruction Memorandum No. 2003-150, dated April 16, 2003, (attached). It establishes two types of awards for non-energy solid minerals mining operations. They are: "The Hardrock Mineral Environmental Award" and "The Hardrock Mineral Award for Community Outreach and Economic Security."

Eligible operations may include base and precious metals, industrial minerals, salable minerals and non-energy leasable minerals. The awards program recognizes mine operators that have made exemplary contributions to hardrock minerals management regardless of land ownership. The Department is also acknowledging operations that exemplify the Secretary's four C's initiative: consultation, cooperation, communication all in the service of conservation. Nominations for fiscal year 2003 may be made by regulatory authorities, mining companies, nearby landowners, members of the general public and must be sent to the Colorado State Office by May 30, 2003.

This is an opportunity for us to honor outstanding constituents that have gone the extra mile for the health of the lands in Colorado. For your use, a detailed description of the awards program is attached. Nominations made under this program should be sent to Roy Drew, Geologist, CO-921, 303-239-3772.

Subject: Announcement of a New Reclamation and Sustainable Mineral
Development Awards Program DD: 06/30/2003

Issue: The Department of Interior (DOI), through the Office of Surface Mining, Reclamation and Enforcement (OSM), has presented reclamation awards to coal mine operators for the past sixteen years. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) regulates non-energy leasable, salable and locatable mining on public land and could benefit by offering an award program similar to the OSM program for these other commodities. The DOI has requested that BLM institute such a program and that the program be open to solid mineral operations nationally without regard to land ownership.

Background: The DOI, through OSM, has conducted a coal mining reclamation award program since 1986. This award program has been an important component of OSM's overall approach to ensuring that land is returned to a productive use after coal mining. This new award program is being initiated to recognize mine operators who made exemplary contributions to solid minerals development. Two kinds of awards will be available: "The Hardrock Mineral Environmental Award" and "The Hardrock Mineral Award For Community Outreach and Economic Security." This allows for awards to be granted for work in any of the three components of Sustainable Development: environmental health, social responsibility and economic security. The Secretary's four Cs initiative: consultation, cooperation, communication---all in the service of conservation, is integral and basic to the nomination for and approval of these awards.

Policy: The DOI has created this award program to showcase some of the finest examples of responsible mineral resource development. The award winners will illustrate our understanding of Sustainable Development - development that meets the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. The award program will help us transfer successful ideas and practices from one place to additional locations throughout the nation.

Implementation: The State Offices will assist the Washington Office in publicizing this award program. A detailed description of the award program is attached. This may be distributed to the public as notice of the award program. The Washington Office will provide additional promotional materials separately. The Washington Office will also coordinate language for press releases to avoid duplication of effort. Please provide the name of a State Office contact for this program to Phil Allard by email to Phil_Allard@blm.gov.

The State Office will process any nomination submitted under this program. The State Office will verify the information that is submitted with the nomination and determine if the nominee is in compliance with all applicable regulations. When a nominee is not regulated by the BLM, the State Office will need to obtain written confirmation from the regulator that the nominee is in compliance. All nominations will be forwarded to the Washington office, Solid Minerals Group (WO-320) by June 30, 2003. The State Office will include a statement of their findings with each nomination.

The judges for this program have not yet been selected. Each State Office is invited to nominate people who are qualified to judge the nominations for this award program. Judges may be members of the public, from Federal or State government or from academic institutions.

Budget Implications: The budget impact of this award program is minimal. Any Bureau travel costs associated with this award program will be paid by the Washington Office.

Manual/Handbook Sections: No manual or handbook sections are affected by this program.

Coordination: Coordination activities for this award program are ongoing. A variety of organizations have shown an interest in this program and have provided examples of other successful award programs. Organizations with an interest in solid mineral management will be notified of this award program and invited to submit nominations.

Reclamation and Sustainable Mineral Development Awards Program

Sponsored by the United States Department of Interior's Bureau of Land Management

The Department of the Interior (DOI) is the nation's principal conservation agency. Our mission is to protect America's treasures for future generations, provide access to our nation's natural and cultural heritage, offer recreation opportunities, honor our trust responsibilities to American Indians and Alaska Natives and our responsibilities to island communities, conduct scientific research, provide wise stewardship of energy and mineral resources, foster sound use of land and water resources, and conserve and protect fish and wildlife. DOI manages 507 million acres of surface land, or about one-fifth of the land in the United States, including 95 million acres managed by the Fish and Wildlife Service, 84 million acres managed by the National Park Service and 262 million acres managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Much of this land is managed for resource protection, such as at Yellowstone and Yosemite National Parks, two of the nation's crown jewels, but other lands are managed for multiple use benefits including mineral development.

The DOI has created the Reclamation and Sustainable Development Awards Program to showcase some of the finest examples of responsible mineral resource development. The award winners will illustrate our understanding of Sustainable Development - development that meets the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. The award program will help us transfer successful ideas and practices from one place to additional locations throughout the nation. We can also acknowledge and thank those individuals and organizations that make a difference to the quality of life we all share.

This new award program is being initiated to recognize mine operators that have made exemplary contributions to hardrock minerals management in either of the categories listed below. The DOI also intends to recognize those operations that exemplify the Secretary's four Cs initiative: consultation, cooperation, communication---all in the service of conservation. The Secretary has requested that BLM provide the administrative support for this award program; however, nominations need not be limited to projects on public land. The Secretary's recognition of outstanding examples of the application of the 4Cs and Sustainable Development benefits public land and furthers our mission because it encourages others to adopt these successful ideas and practices. Coal mining operators will not be eligible for recognition through this program but are encouraged to participate in the reclamation award program managed by the Office of Surface Mining.

The Hardrock Mineral Environmental Award

The Hardrock Mineral Environmental Award is a component of Sustainable Development that relates to environmental stewardship. This category recognizes achievements demonstrating continuous or repeated efforts to successfully meet or exceed Federal, State or local reclamation requirements with minimal oversight. Outstanding efforts to work with the public, the DOI or other regulators to further

multiple-use objectives in a solid minerals area would qualify candidates for this award. In addition to high quality reclamation, an operator may have undertaken extraordinary measures to reduce the footprint of the operation on the land, reducing the need for reclamation.

The judges will consider the extent to which the operator consulted and cooperated with other stakeholders to determine the goals of reclamation and post mining land use when evaluating nominations in this category. Recognition with this award may be granted to organizations that provide outstanding examples of any of the following:

- Adopting best practices to minimize environmental degradation and adapting them to local conditions as necessary.
- Preventing pollution and minimizing noise and dust during operations.
- Handling hazardous materials safely.
- Reclaiming the land to prevent erosion and planting native species targeting the same plant communities as existed prior to mining.
- Being a leader in developing, establishing and implementing good environmental practices.

The Hardrock Mineral Award For Community Outreach and Economic Security

The Hardrock Mineral Award For Community Outreach and Economic Security are components of Sustainable Development that relate to the concern shown for community responsibilities and the economic benefits of mineral development. This category recognizes the successful coordination of projects with local and regional stakeholders. Projects that contribute to the quality of life or demonstrate concern for the long-term health of the local community can be recognized in this category. In this category DOI can also recognize operators whose use of new or innovative techniques allow them to successfully operate in technically challenging conditions or in critical environmental settings. The judges will also consider any particularly creative ways operators incorporated community concerns in their development or closure plans. Particularly notable examples of the following kinds of activities could qualify a nominee for an award:

- Engaging local communities and other affected organizations in an open, honest and effective process of consultation for the entire project life.
- Promoting health and safety both on and off the project site.
- Investing in programs that improve the skills and productivity of the workforce.

- Developing strategies for sustaining the local economy after mine closure.
- Being a progressive and constructive partner in advancing the economic, educational and social infrastructure of the community.

Who is eligible for this award?

Operators in the solid mineral industries can be nominated for an award. Solid mineral development includes mining for a wide variety of commodities including precious metals, base metals, industrial minerals, and construction materials. The nominated operators must clearly demonstrate a commitment to excellence.

How do I nominate an operator or organization for this award?

Nominations are the beginning of the selection process. Mining companies, regulatory authorities, nearby landowners and members of the general public may nominate operations for these awards. Company officials and employees may nominate their own operations for recognition.

Nominations must contain all of the information listed in the “Required Information” section and indicate the award category for the nomination. Nominations should be sent to the BLM State Office with jurisdiction for public lands in the State where the operation is located. Required Information

Cover sheet containing:

- Company, organization or person's name making nomination
- Name and location of the nominated operation
- Award category
- Name, address, phone number and email address (if available) of a contact person in the company or organization and of the person submitting the nomination, if different.

Narrative Description:

- Brief history and background of the mining practice, reclamation or community activity nominated for the award

- Description of the specific activity or practice, including specifics on problems, solutions, benefits and unusual circumstances
- Effectiveness of the work, quantified where possible
- Transferability of the work or value of the accomplishments to other mining or mineral management operations
- Long term benefits to the land owner, neighboring properties and the community
- Statement summarizing why the award is deserved

Photographs

Photographs should be included if they help to document the success of the nominated activity. Not all nominated activities can be photographed, but pictures should be included when available. Photographs should be 8” by 10” or smaller and include a description explaining what is illustrated and a date.

Format

Please submit five copies of the nomination on 8½” by 11” paper. Our panel of judges need the additional copies. Please limit your nomination to 6 pages of text. There is no limit on the number of photographs you can include.

Supporting documentation, such as letters of recognition from regulators or community officials, is not required but may be submitted with the nomination.

Selection of Award Winners

The BLM State Offices will review each of the nominations they receive, verify the information contained in the nomination and that the operation or program complies with applicable regulations. All nominations will be forwarded to the BLM Headquarters Office with recommendations for judging. Please note that nominations need not be limited to operations on land managed by BLM even though BLM is providing administrative support for this award system to DOI.

The panel of judges will consist of mining experts and may be State or Federal employees, employees of academic institutions or members of the public. Each judge will rate each application based on the following criteria:

Criteria	Maximum Points
Clarity and thoroughness of the nomination	10
Effectiveness of the project or program	25
Transferability of the technique, practice or program	20
Difficulty presented by the problem addressed by the project or program	20
Extent to which the project or program exceeds regulatory requirements or public	25

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The judges' scores are then tallied and the finalists are selected. The judges will be encouraged to use their personal experience to guide them when evaluating the unique aspects of each application. There may be situations where the categories above do not adequately capture all of these unique characteristics. The judges may modify the categories by consensus if there is a need to do so. The award winners will then be selected from the list of finalists. The judges determine the number of finalists that are selected. There is no minimum or maximum number of awards that may be granted in any one year. There may not be a winner in both categories in each year.

Important Dates

For the 2003 award cycle nominations are due to BLM State Office by May 30, 2003. BLM State Offices will complete their review and forward nominations to BLM headquarters by June 30, 2003. The results of the judging will be announced on August 18, 2003, and the awards will be presented on the first or second of October, 2003 in Washington, D.C.
