APPLICANT: North Park Snow Snakes

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED ACTION: The Proposed Action would authorize a competitive snowmobile event at Walden Reservoir on February 17 & 18, 2007. This event would host approximately 150 to 300 competitors and spectators. The competition race course, staging area, and spectator viewing would take place on the frozen reservoir and snow covered area west of County Road 15 within the SW1/4, SW1/4 of Sec. 20, T. 9 N., R. 79 W. Additional parking and vending area would be limited to the adjacent private land, the snow covered area west of County Road 15 in the SW1/4, SW1/4 of Sec. 20, T. 9 N., R. 79 W, and on the existing roadways. Portable toilets would be provided for spectators and competitors, and an ambulance would be located on site (see attachment #1 for project map).
