## **CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION**

NUMBER: CO-120-2007-37-CX

PROJECT NAME: Kremmling Running Series and Kremmling Golf Classic

LEGAL DESCRIPTION: Wolford Travel Management Area; T1N R80W sec. 1-10; T1.5N R80W sec. 31-35; T2 N R80W sec. 15-22, 28-35; T1N R81W sec. 1; T2N R81W sec. 25

APPLICANT: Kremmling Chamber of Commerce

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED ACTION: The Kremmling Chamber of Commerce is proposing to host a series of running events that would be taking place within the Wolford Mountain Travel Management Area (WMTMA). Due to the nature of the events and the Memorandum of Understanding between the Kremmling Chamber of Commerce and the Bureau of Land Management, the events would be co-sponsored between the two entities.

The Kremmling Chamber and event organizers agree to provide sufficient volunteers to temporarily mark the running series routes and to staff roads and trail intersections on race days to provide direction for the designated route and safety for racers and other visitors to the WMTMA. The running series would consist of seven events as described below and would be held on existing routes that are designated within the Wolford Mountain Travel Management Plan (see map attachments).

Another event hosted by the Kremmling Chamber is the annual Kremmling Golf Classic that takes place on the cliffs overlooking Kremmling during Kremmling Days, June 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>. Participants drive golf balls off of the cliffs aiming at targets below on private property every year. The organizers of this event would provide a portable restroom on the cliffs and would use only temporary signage and marking for the event. Any markings and signage would be removed after the event has occurred.

For each proposed event, there would be an estimate of 100-300 participants.

**REMARKS:**

Cultural Resources: All races are currently proposed on routes designated as part of the Wolford Mountain OHV route designation. If future activities associated with the race include large water, first aide, or other stations, those areas would need to be identified and a Class III inventory would be conducted at that locale(s).

Native American Religious Concerns: No tribal consultation was conducted for this event. Tribal consultation was conducted as part of the Wolford Mountain Travel Management Planning effort.

Threatened and Endangered Species: There would be no impacts to threatened or endangered species.

Soil/Water Concerns: Parking lots, if any, should be designated prior to the event to help minimize increasing bare ground expanses. Parking lots would only be used during dry soil conditions. Informational signage should be placed at the race registration booths that springs, streams and trough water is not potable.

COMPLIANCE PLAN: The attached Special Stipulations will be a part of the permit and authorization. Monitoring will be performed by the BLM Outdoor Recreation Planner.
