Hunter Vehicle PSA

“Hunters need a quick eye, or the perfect shot may get away.

But hunters need to keep an eye behind them.

Their vehicle may ignite dry grass.

Avoid dry grass and clean under your vehicle, or wildfire will catch us in our tracks.

Harvest PSA

"Harvest Time. But there are dangers.

Take the time to remove straw and vines from working parts.

Watch for fires from exhaust and drive lines.

Be prepared to put out a small fire before it grows.

And set up a fire break.

Don't let your hard work go up in smoke.

Fire Restrictions Stage 1 PSA

"Stage one fire restrictions are now in effect.

Campfires and stove fires must be in a designated campground where a fire structure, such as a metal ring, is provided.

Smoking is only allowed in an enclosed vehicle, at a developed recreation site or in an area that is cleared of debris for three feet in all directions.

Fire restrictions apply to all land outside of city limits.

Those places we enjoy camping, boating and hiking.

Check with your local fire agency to learn about all restricted areas and associated regulations.

Fire Restrictions Stage 2 PSA

"Stage two fire restrictions are now in effect.

The following are not allowed on public land until further notice:

Building or using a camp fire or stove fire.

Operating ATV's and motorized vehicles off roads and trails.

Smoking except in an enclosed vehicle, a recreation site or in an area cleared of debris three feet in all directions.

The following acts are not allowed from 1:00pm to 1:00am:

Using a chainsaw and equipment with an internal combustion engine

Blasting, welding and all activities that generate flame or flammable materials

Defensible Space PSA

"We defend our homes for thieves, pests and weeds.

What about wildfire?

Your local fire prevention cooperators have some simple ways to defend your home from wildfire.

Like thinning the trees and brush around your home that can fuel the fire.

Move other sources, like firewood, and volatile materials a safe distance from your home.

Dead Out PSA

"Human caused fires account for nearly 90% of the wildfires in this country.

We must do everything we can to limit this destruction before our lands, literally, go up in smoke.

Before starting a fire, make sure you have a shovel, bucket and container of water.

Watch for overhanging brush.

Clear flammable debris away from the site, and never start your fire on a windy day.

And take the time to make sure your fire is dead out.

Remember, when it comes to preventing wildfires, it only takes one."

Campfire Family PSA

"Ok boys it's time to gather up and get ready to go. Come get your sleeping bags.

Think you can't go camping without a campfire?

Well what about the fire?

It's alright, it looks like it's about out.

Try camping without a forest.

"And now a quick game of true or false.

You don't need a permit for an ag burn because you never got one in the past.

False.

You need both an Idaho DEQ and Local Fire District permits.

That's true.

Failure to comply is punishable by significant fine, and if a fire leaves your property and burns something up and fire suppression is required, you could be held responsible for damages.

Be fire smart this year.
