Dear Reader:

Enclosed for your review is the Draft Resource Management Plan (DRMP) and Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Utah Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Moab Field Office. This document was prepared by the BLM in consultation with cooperating agencies, and in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA), implementing regulations, the BLM's land use planning handbook (H-1601-1), and other applicable law.

The planning area consists of about 2.5 million acres of land which includes about 1.8 million acres of public lands managed by the Moab Field Office. There are about 1.5 million acres of public lands in Grand County, and about 300,000 acres of public land in San Juan County. When approved, this RMP will replace the 1985 Grand Resource Area RMP. The overall intent of the revised RMP is to develop a land use plan that will guide the management of public lands administered by the Moab Field Office into the future. The BLM encourages you to provide information and comments pertaining to the analysis presented in the Moab RMP. Of particular importance is feedback concerning the adequacy and accuracy of the four proposed alternatives, the analysis of their respective management decisions, and any new information that would help the BLM produce a Proposed Plan. In developing the Proposed RMP/Final EIS, which is the next phase of the planning process, the decision maker may select various management decisions from each of the alternatives analyzed in the DRMP/DEIS for the purpose of creating a management strategy that best meets the needs of the resources and values in this area under the multiple use and sustained yield mandate. Your timely comments will help formulate the Proposed RMP/Final EIS.

Public meetings to provide an overview of the document, respond to questions, and take public comments will be held subsequent to the release of the draft. These meetings will be announced by local media and public mailings. Public meetings will be held at Moab, Monticello, and Salt Lake City, Utah and at Grand Junction, Colorado.

To facilitate analysis of comments and information submitted, we strongly encourage you to submit comments in an electronic format.

Your review and comments on the content of this document are critical to the success of this planning effort. If you wish to submit comments on the Draft RMP/DEIS, we request that you

make them as specific as possible. Comments will be more helpful if they include suggested changes, sources, or methodologies, and reference to a section or page number. Comments containing only opinions or preferences will be considered and included as part of the decision making process, although they will not receive a formal response from the BLM. Comments will be accepted for ninety (90) calendar days following the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) publication of its Notice of Availability in the Federal Register. The BLM can best utilize your comments and resource information submissions if received within the review period.

It is BLM's practice to make comments, including names and addresses of respondents, available for public review. Before including your address, phone number, e-mail address, or other personal identifying information in your comment, be advised that your entire comment, including your personal identifying information, may be made publicly available at any time. While you can ask us in your comment to withhold your personal identifying information from public review, we cannot guarantee that we will be able to do so. All submissions from organizations and businesses, and from individuals identifying themselves as representatives or officials of organizations and businesses, will be available for public inspection in their entirety.

BLM would like to thank our cooperating agency partners that have worked so hard to help us complete this document. They have provided support and expertise to facilitate focusing the issues and developing alternatives to help resolve the many compelling resource concerns that face the Moab Field Office. We would like to particularly recognize Grand and San Juan Counties, the State of Utah and its agencies, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as cooperating agencies on this DRMP/DEIS. Their experience and dedication has made this a better process and BLM looks forward to continuing work with them to complete this planning effort. We also extend thanks to those individuals and organizations that have provided extensive information and many excellent ideas that have been considered during this process.

Copies of the Draft RMP/EIS have been sent to affected Federal, State, and local government agencies. Copies of the Draft RMP/EIS are available for public inspection at the Grand County, San Juan County and Salt Lake City public libraries. 
