BLM Canyon Country District Switches to ePlanning for NEPA Documents

Moab, Utah— The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Canyon Country District, including the Moab and the Monticello Field Offices, will utilize the ePlanning system for all new National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) projects initiated after May 18, 2015. ePlanning is the BLM’s national register for NEPA documents and will replace the Utah Environmental Notification Bulletin Board (ENBB) over time. NEPA projects that were initiated prior to May 18, 2015 that are currently listed on Utah's ENBB will remain on the ENBB. The ePlanning system can be accessed at:

To locate a project on the above webpage, either use the map on the home page or click on “Text Search” and select your search parameters (including State(s), Office(s), Document Type(s), Fiscal Year(s) and/or Program(s)).

To submit a comment on the above webpage, choose the “Advanced Search” hyperlink under “Text Search,” and type the project name in the “Project Name” field. Open the project website and click on the “Comment on Document” button.
