- The BLM anticipates an 8-percent reduction in the budget.
- The BLM considers the RAC meetings a high priority, and intends to continue funding.
- The BLM would appreciate the RAC's input into a Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) issue.

**Agenda item:** Greater Sage-Grouse

**Presenter:** Buddy Green

**Discussion:**

- BLM Wyoming's current focus is on the "Nine-Plan," amending six resource management plans (RMP) for Pinedale, Rawlins, Casper, Kemmerer, Rock Springs and Newcastle; and three USDA Forest Service national forest plans.
- A preferred alternative workshop with cooperators was conducted in January 2013.

**Discussion cont'd: Greater Sage-Grouse**

- The next three steps include: finalizing the preferred alternative, conducting impact analysis and preparing the draft environmental impact statement (EIS) for 90-day public comment period, expected in the late fall of 2013.
  - The Bighorn Basin RMP anticipates a response to public comment and issue of the proposed plan and final EIS for a 30-day protest period in the spring of 2014.
  - The Buffalo RMP draft EIS and RMP were released for a 90-day public comment period June 28 and anticipate beginning the protest period in the spring of 2014.
  - The Lander RMP's proposed plan and final EIS were released Feb. 22. The record of decision (ROD) is being prepared. Responses to protests and the issuance of the approved RMP and ROD are the next steps.
  - The Rock Springs RMP is currently formulating alternatives with cooperators. A notice of intent was issued for wild horse and burro management, which reopened the scoping period from Aug. 16-Sept. 16. A draft EIS/RMP may be issued for 90-day public comment period by the spring of 2014.

Buddy Green, Forest health, National Historic Preservation Act; Mark Storzer, HDD, energy projects;

**Discussion:**

- Forest health: Governor Mead established a task force on forest health to develop near and long term strategies in cooperation with federal and state agencies.
- National Historic Preservation Act: BLM Wyoming drafted revised protocols, guiding the agency on compliance with Section 106.
  - Some bentonite miners have concerns and the Mining Association is circulating comments.
  - Comments may be submitted. There have been discussions with the mining industry on project-specific issues.
- HDD: The Rock Springs RMP, Rawlins RMP visual resource management plan and compliance with wild horse and burro management are the current large projects.
  - The wild horse and burro gather schedule is determined at the national level.
  - Weather and funding play a role in determining gather dates and times.
  - The Wild Horse and Burro Program, including complying with the 2013 Consent Decree between the Rock Springs Grazing Association, the Department of the Interior and the BLM, is among the top three priorities for the BLM national director.
  - The Rock Springs Wild Horse Holding Facility is near capacity.
- HDD Energy projects: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will prepare a supplemental EIS in order to issue an Eagle Take Permit for the Chokecherry Sierra Madre wind project, which will add time to the project.
- BHB/WR: Devon Energy withdrew its proposal for a coal bed methane project in the Gas Hills area.
- Water: Las Vegas will not pursue water from the Colorado River, of which the Green River is a part.
  - The Water Conservation Board believes there is insufficient water in the Colorado River.
  - Ten million people are predicted to be facing a water shortage over the next 10 years.

**Conclusions:**

- The RAC subcommittee that analyzed wild horse and burro management and the consent decree recommend no changes to the RAC's position paper on the topic.

**Discussion:**

- Three primers are available: Market-based Wildlife Mitigation in Wyoming (<http://bit.ly/1hej2wG>), Natural Gas and Wildlife Mitigation in Wyoming (<http://bit.ly/18k9DRL>), and Wind Development and Wildlife Mitigation in Wyoming (<http://bit.ly/1aTSP1>).
- Aerial fertilization of 30,598 acres of sagebrush with urea is a current UW project in the Upper Green River Basin to mitigate the decline in the mule deer population.
  - Sagebrush is the preferred food source due to high nutritive value and minerals
  - The cost is approximately \$55 per acre.

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**Agenda item:** Wyoming Migration Initiative

**Presenter:** Matthew Kauffman, Wyoming Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Unit, University of Wyoming

**Discussion:**

- Wyoming has some of the longest wildlife migration corridors in the 48 contiguous states
- The Wyoming Migration Initiative helps plot migration routes and behaviors of wildlife.
  - The routes pass near or through developed areas, mineral developments and other locations.
  - The initiative helps identify areas of potential concern for wildlife.
- Coordination with other agencies, including the BLM is already underway.
  - A Red Desert to Hoback Conservation Assessment (threat assessment) will be delivered to agencies to allow prioritization of on-the-ground projects in the migration corridor.

**Conclusions:**

- The coordination between agencies and academic community has greatly improved over the last 10-15 years.
  - More coordination is needed to further align scientific research with the operational environment.
  - Corporate sponsorship may be a way to incorporate more research into applications.
  - The BLM could potentially identify current projects with academia and present findings at future RAC meetings.

**Discussion:**

- The use of common terminology and understanding of definitions helps in the discussion.
- Some recommendations by the subcommittee may not be practical or possible, depending on the situation.
- Terminology within the recommendations may need adjustments.
- There are no legal impediments to the recommendations.

**Discussion:**

- The Wyoming Reclamation and Restoration Center's mission is three-fold: reclamation, research and outreach.
- The Wyoming Reclamation Database Project collects data on the amount of land disturbed, reclaimed, the level of success of the reclamation, which methods were the most successful and what helped aid improvement for Greater Sage-Grouse habitat.
  - Data collected showed inconsistency in regulations from different field offices, inconsistency in reclamation monitoring and a lack of sufficient numbers of reference sites and commonality in data collection.
- RAC members identified there is a wide range of reclamation requirements for a range of projects.

- The BLM may be able to improve by capitalizing on overlapping resources through cooperative monitoring, including Greater Sage-Grouse reporting.
- Certifying individuals in reclamation may standardize the process, but it may create a barrier for property owners and others to participate in reclamation programs.
- The BLM has regulations and requirements which help establish standardization.
- Sampling methods and consistency in methodology is difficult, but needed.
- The BLM is still developing and improving as technology develops and improves.
- There are concerns about the factors involved in some aspects of standardization including:
  - different results occur due to weather and plant physiology;
  - monitoring requirements covering multiple locations with a limited workforce (seasonal employment).

**Conclusions:**

- A better understanding is needed regarding Stahl's research and conclusions.
- The BLM needs to review current practices and verify personnel are meeting current regulations and requirements.
  - Reviews should include the effect on BLM resources, differences between field offices that may cause issues and its effects on commercial use.
- A stronger partnership with university researchers is needed to ensure everyone uses the same terminology and understands the processes.

- The University of Wyoming presentations during the first day of the November RAC meeting were good.
- The Wyoming Outdoor Council plans to submit comments regarding a request by Department of the Interior Secretary Sally Jewell for mitigation plans.
- The Wyoming Outdoor Council urges adoption of the open meetings recommendations discussed during the first day of the November RAC meeting.

**Agenda item:** Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) issue  
**Presenter:** Mark Storzer

**Discussion:**

- Human remains were discovered on public land.
- The situation faced is determining if the remains are Native American burial or a homicide scene.
- The issues are developing agreements with cooperating agencies and building public awareness to ensure the handling of remains in compliance with NAGPRA, if they are Native American.
- A recent case involving a human remains discovery in Sweetwater County demonstrated a need for improved awareness for the general public and local authorities.
- A previous case in Fremont County serves as the model for interagency cooperation.
- The Fremont County Coroner maintains positive relationships and practices with area tribes.
- A partnership with area tribes may increase the impact of the message.
- The problem may not be isolated to the BLM; other agencies could have similar issues.
- Various tribes have different repatriation practices.
- Law enforcement and NAGPRA may have competing interests.

**Conclusions:**

- A memorandum of agreement or understanding should be signed among the BLM, other federal agencies and local authorities on a county-by county basis.
- The memorandum should balance NAGPRA requirements with law enforcement.
- The Fremont County Coroner may have the best practices and should be consulted to formulate the memorandum.
- The Fremont County Coroner may have the strongest network of local officials and should be consulted about addressing the Wyoming County Coroner's Association





