Meeting Minutes

Agenda Item: Welcome

Presenter: Don Simpson, State Director, Wyoming State Office (WYSO)

Introduction:

- The BLM is working on streamlining the land use planning process; tentatively anticipating a strategy in April and a draft of the regulations by Christmas of 2014.
 - Greater Sage-Grouse management is being amended in the Great Basin states and throughout Wyoming; Wyoming is ahead of most states; and the core concept is highly regarded.
 - Adaptive management will be a key component of the Wyoming sage-grouse management plan: determine what is causing the problem, and then figure out how to fix it.

Agenda Item: Worland Field Office (WFO) Overview

Presenter: Becky Good, Worland Field Manager

Discussion:

- There are 32 employees managing 2.7 million surface acres and 4.2 million subsurface acres (Cody and Worland subsurface combined).
- Programs managed include recreation, oil and gas, bentonite, and historical and cultural resources.

Agenda Item: Introduction to bentonite

Presenters: Alex Jenson, WFO geologist; Marit Bovee, WFO archaeologist

Bentonite Discussion:

- Locatable mineral exploration and extraction is authorized under the 1872 Mining Law and 43 CFR 3809. The Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 allows the Department of the Interior to prevent undue and unnecessary degradation as a result of these activities.
- BLM and the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) have a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to do a joint review and approval of the plans of operations, joint inspections, and review and release bonds.
- Challenges to successful reclamation: precipitation, soils, and invasive weeds.
- Discretionary versus statutory: the BLM has discretionary control over leasable minerals, but with locatable minerals, the BLM does not have discretionary control. The withdrawal of those minerals requires an act of Congress.

Archaeological Discussion:

- Prior to any action on undertaking, agencies must consider the potential effects on any historical resources and must consult with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) under Section 106.
- Direct impacts on the area of potential effect versus indirect impacts on the area of potential effect were defined and discussed.
- Timeframe for determining eligibility of a site depends on the site, size and type of the proposed action and other factors.

Conclusions:

- The BLM staff should be aware that often local governments are able to assist with the consultation process. As this is generally done at the state level, local knowledge and information is often overlooked. Local governments should be included in the consultation process.

Agenda Item: Bentonite Mining Panel

Moderator: Steve Dondero, District Manager, Wind River/Big Horn Basin District (WR/BBD)

Panel Members: Dale Nuttal, Wyo-Ben; Bruce Lawson, Black Hills Bentonite; Matthew Dillon, American Colloid Company.

Discussion:

- All three companies operate on both public and private lands and face many of the same challenges:
 - Permitting process with the BLM is viewed as inefficient and redundant by the companies.
 - Each identified achieving successful reclamation, especially regarding cheat grass and sage brush as important.
 - Each identified protecting historic, cultural, and wildlife resources as important.
 - Each participate in managing Greater Sage-Grouse.
- Public perception of the mining industry at the local level is generally positive, and at the larger, national scale there are some misconceptions.
- There is concern regarding the redundancy of the federal and state reviews due to similar requirements. However, the federal National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) and the review required by Wyoming state statute result in different levels of review and both are dictated by law.
- A revision of the existing MOU between the BLM and the Wyoming DEQ's Land Quality Division is under way.
 - Industry feels this process is just codifying what has already been occurring, redundant reviews, and will not improve processing times.
 - The revision opened up discussions on the possibility of larger projects:
 - A minimum 640 acres for an environmental impact statement (EIS) NEPA review is only a recommendation and offers the potential for flexibility.

Conclusions:

- If the industry were able to do larger projects without having to do an EIS, it would increase efficiency and enable better planning.
- If the cultural and historic review could be streamlined, it would reduce processing times.

Agenda Item: Introduction to enhanced oil recovery

Presenter: Frank Sanders, WFO petroleum engineer

Discussion:

- Enhanced oil recovery (EOR) is any method of increasing the ultimate recovery of oil and/or gas that would normally be impossible during primary or secondary production.
- Fracking is not considered EOR. EOR is generally a field-wide operation.
- EOR can be chemical, thermal, miscible, microbial, electrical, leaching, or mechanical.
- CO₂ EOR is possible in the district and its potential effects were analyzed in the Bighorn Basin Resource Management Plan.
- Currently infrastructure is incomplete for CO₂ EOR in the Big Horn Basin.

Agenda Item: Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) Issue

Presenters: Ranel Capron, WYSO archaeologist; Kathy Boden, WYSO archaeologist; Edward McAuslan, Fremont County coroner.

Discussion:

- There is only one signed MOU between the BLM and a county coroner (Fremont County) regarding NAGPRA.
 - MOUs must be signed by each county coroner each time a new coroner is elected.
 - Notification procedures (of finding human remains) are county specific.
 - There appears to be a lack of understanding regarding the various roles of the BLM and the county coroners regarding whom to contact when human remains are found on federal land.
 - BLM will contact the coroner and affected tribes and initiate tribal consultation, as appropriate.
- The MOU between the BLM and Fremont County Coroner is an excellent example of effective collaboration.

Conclusions:

- Develop a more effective strategy for educating the public about NAGPRA on federal lands.
 - Improving or increasing public information about the respective roles that the BLM and the county coroners play may help.
 - Developing MOUs between the BLM field offices and county coroners should be done on an individual basis.
 - It may be beneficial to talk with the field office law enforcement officers to determine existing agreements with local law enforcement agencies.

Field Trip Minutes

The group visited a Wyo-Ben bentonite mining location on federal land, and discussed issues concerning reclamation, control of cheat grass and bonding requirements. The active mining location demonstrated the beginning of a process that is anticipated to take 30 to 40 years and yield 40,000 tons of bentonite per year.

Following the active mining location, the group toured the Wyo-Ben bentonite processing facility in Lucerne, Wyo. The group saw the drying, processing and packaging of bentonite. The tour also included a stop at an oil field first discovered in 1918, currently owned and operated by Legacy Oil and Gas Inc. This point on the tour illustrated an older field that would benefit from EOR and in particular the use of CO₂ to lengthen the life of the field.

Agenda Item: NAGPRA discussion (continued from March 12)
Presenters: Marit Bovee; Kathy Boden; Ranel Capron; Ed McAuslen

Discussion and Identified Issues:

- Need to develop an effective notification process and working relationships on a county-specific basis, possibly using the WFO-Fremont County MOU as an example.
- Public and private land ownership boundaries need to be considered.
- Identify public information resources and methods:
 - Add NAGPRA to Wyoming Game and Fish Hunter Safety courses.
 - Include NAGPRA information on cards, or attached to hunter identification cards, hunting licenses and fishing licenses
 - Need a single point of contact for those who locate remains, or perhaps through the use of the 1-800 number (similar to what is used in other states).

Agenda Item: Wyo-Ben discussion
Presenters: Alex Jensen, Frank Sanders, Rick Magstadt, Dale Nuttal

Discussion:

- Archaeology requires the longest review time, and is sometimes outside the control of the BLM.
- There is only one timeline associated with the 43 CFR 3809 regulations: the initial 30 day administrative review.
- Need to make better use of pre-application meetings and notifications.
- Basin-wide programmatic EIS for mining would not necessarily help because it is too generic; site-specific consultation would still need to occur.
- A bentonite and uranium working group should be assembled with invited participants to include:

- Larry Claypool (lead), Penny Bellah, district managers (as needed), a BLM NEPA coordinator, 3809-regulations expert, two bentonite industry representatives from the bentonite mining subcommittee of the Wyoming Mining Association (WMA), two uranium industry representatives, and a BLM Montana representative.
- The bentonite mining working group could consider these issues and present to the WMA:
 - Potential for streamlining the approval process, especially regarding pre-planning and archaeological review periods, specifically upon the submission of plans of operations and undertaking to allow tribal consultations to begin.

Agenda Item: Enhanced oil recovery panel

Moderator: Becky Good

Panel Members: Chad Forsman, Legacy Reserves Operating, LP; Chuck Peterson, Devon Energy; R.J. Whisonant, Marathon Oil Corporation.

Discussion:

- Devon Energy, Legacy Reserves Operating, and Marathon Oil Corporation have used EOR in fields in the district and in other areas.
- All three companies are interested in the use of CO₂ EOR in the district area.
 - Benefits generally include increased production, minimal surface disturbance, low risk (i.e. resource exists) and the extension of the life of an oil field.
 - Challenges include significant capital expenditure, potential initial lost production, CO₂ cost and availability, and regulatory stipulations.
- The Big Horn Basin lacks CO₂.

There are limited economic justifications to tie into the Denbury Pipeline. There must be multiple oil and gas fields with high potential.

Agenda Item: The National Minerals Lab presentation

Presenters: Marilyn Wegweiser, lab director, WYSO

Discussion:

- The lab is located in Worland, Wyo.
- It was established as result of increased bentonite mining. The federal government wanted to establish federal reserves and to be prepared for increased patenting.
- The lab receives samples from multiple sources, including the U.S. Geological Survey, BLM field and state offices, the Department of Justice, the Bureau of Reclamation, the Internal Revenue Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and others.

- The lab tests for industrial quality, presence of certain minerals and analyzes evidence for pending court cases.

Agenda Item: NEPA subcommittee presentation and RAC vote

Presenter: Marilyn Mackey, RAC chairman

Discussion:

- Proposal to the RAC was put forward by the Transparency Subcommittee, led by Doug Thompson.
 - Increase transparency in the BLM land use planning process to make planning more accessible to members of the public.
 - This should be accomplished by having specific cooperating agency meetings that are open to the public, including pre-scoping, prior to alternatives being finalized and following release of a draft EIS.
- Two main concerns were raised by members of the RAC:
 - Not all cooperators and/or proponents want the meetings to be open.
 - Would this apply to just land use planning, or to all EIS-level projects?

Conclusions:

- RAC members will submit comments to the RAC Coordinator before March 21, 2014, regarding any changes they would like to see.
- The amended document will be presented to RAC members at next meeting.
- The RAC will vote on the motion at next RAC meeting in June.

Agenda Item: Public Comment Period

Discussion:

- Mike Baker – Hot Springs County Commissioner
 - Concerns regarding communication between the RAC and the counties – many county commissioners were not aware that this meeting was taking place and would have appreciated the opportunity to participate.
 - Big Horn Basin counties are really encouraging the use of EOR and would appreciate the BLM facilitating the construction of a CO₂ pipeline into and through the basin.
 - As cooperators, the commissioners are very frustrated with the process and the ability to communicate effectively. They often feel like decisions are made in a bureaucratic vacuum.

- Bruce Pendery – Wyoming Outdoor Council
 - Reminded the RAC and the working group on locatable mining to not forget the Council on Environmental Quality regulations, and the rules that NEPA puts into place for the BLM and the federal government to follow.

Agenda Item: Deputy State Director Reports

Presenters: Buddy Green, Larry Claypool

Discussion:

- Wild horses:
 - Population surveys are slated to begin in April.
 - Divide Basin horse gather environmental assessment is being developed now and will be finalized after the population surveys are completed.
 - Scoping for the Lander Field Office wild horse eco-sanctuary closed March 4.
 - The wild horse budget is up \$2.8 million from last year, for a total of \$80.2 million, including additional \$2.8 million toward research for population control
- Planning 2.0:
 - Initiated to improve the land use planning process.
 - Two components include regulatory changes to streamline the process and a revision of the NEPA Handbook
 - This initiative will continue to be a discussion item.
- Governor’s Forest Health Task Force:
 - There are 19 stakeholders assembled by the governor to look at the forest condition around the state of Wyoming, the recent high fire severity and economic opportunities.
 - The task force is expected to provide the governor with recommendations on developing short and long term strategies.
- The SHPO protocol revision needs signatures before it will be finalized.
- Wyoming Federal Minerals Report 2013 – overview by Larry Claypool
 - The report highlighted the importance of federal minerals developed in Wyoming regarding the nation’s energy.
 - A packet detailing Wyoming production was distributed.

Agenda Item: District Manager Reports

Discussion:

- Big Horn Basin/Wind River District:
 - The Lander RMP is still awaiting final approval and the final EIS (FEIS) for the Big Horn Basin RMP will be available for cooperator review the week of March 17, 2014.

- High Plains District:
 - The Washington Office review of the Buffalo FEIS is anticipated to be completed soon.
 - The High Plains District is now an Energy Policy Act of 2005 pilot office due to anticipated oil development in the Casper area.
 - The notice of intent for an EIS to analyze up to 5,000 wells in Converse County is under review in the Washington Office.
 - The 5-year strategy for the Powder River Basin Restoration Project is being prepared.
 - The district manager concluded a University of Wyoming test course for how to improve collaboration on natural resource management.
- High Desert District:
 - The district welcomed the new Rock Springs field manager, Kimberlee Foster, and the new associate district manager, Adam George.
 - There is a partial hold on the Rock Springs RMP while the agency awaits completion of the sage-grouse 9-plan.
 - Work continues on the travel management portion of the Rock Springs RMP.

Agenda Item: Greater Sage-Grouse discussion
Presenters: Caleb Hiner, senior resource advisor, WYSO

Discussion:

- An overview of the national, regional, and state Greater Sage-Grouse planning processes was provided, including:
 - Various management zones identified throughout the region.
 - Wyoming is only state with rule (core area strategy) that affects both public and private lands.
 - Wyoming has about 39 percent of the national Greater Sage-Grouse population.
- In 2010, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service declared the Greater Sage-Grouse warranted-but-precluded. A listing decision is anticipated in 2015.

Agenda Item: Future meeting planning

Upcoming Meetings:

- The next meeting is scheduled for Kemmerer, Wyo., June 25-27, 2014.
 - The RAC would like to continue sage brush and sage-grouse discussions, including:

- Requesting a presentation by the Sweetwater County Conservation District’s research regarding cheat grass and research that the University of Utah is doing on raven impacts to sage–grouse.
 - Follow up to the Transparency in the NEPA process subcommittee report and recommendations will include a review of amendments to the document and a vote on a recommendation to BLM Wyoming.
 - Protocol for RAC to recommend to the BLM on NAGPRA coordination with counties, local law enforcement, and education of the public will be presented.
 - A report on the formation of a bentonite working group is slated.
 - Potential site visits include the Ruby Pipeline and prescribed burn field trips regarding the cheat grass discussion.
- The Sept. 24-26, 2014, meeting will be in Casper or Wright, as decided during an upcoming conference call or email poll.
 - Potential discussion topics include: uranium (Pumpkin Buttes) and Section 106; reclamation of roads and wellpads and the Powder River Basin Restoration Initiative; Converse County 5,000 well proposal; the Christiansen Ranch – uranium mill and field; and landowner concerns regarding energy development.
 - Those concerns include interactions among oil/gas/coal/wind/private lands.
